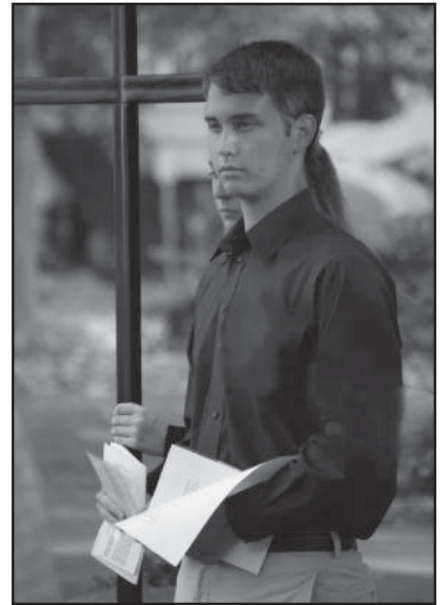

Disaster Relief

I'll Never Get Out Of This World Alive, Steve Earle(2011), CD & iTunes. Steve Earle has released a new album. Though I listened to him and saw him once in concert in the eighties, I was reintroduced to him through the recommendation of a fictional character in the British novelist Ian McKewan's *Saturday*. Since Earle's album *El Corazon* I've been hooked. The latest is produced by the legendary T-Bone Burnett who also sings vocals, and is something of a return to Earle's Tennessee country roots. The eleven original tracks are, says Earle, 'all...about mortality in one way or the other; death as a mystery rather than a punctuation mark or at least a comma rather than a period.' My favorites are the sea-shanty like *The Gulf of Mexico*, and the achingly lovely ballad *Every Part Of Me*. *The theology in God is God is sound: Yeah I believe in God and God ain't me...And I believe in God and God ain't us...But I believe in God. And God is God*. The disasters of Katrina and the recent BP spill loom in the background.

Treme (2010-11). From writer/producer David Simon who brought us the great Baltimore crime series *Homicide: Life on the Street* and *The Wire*, comes the second season of his HBO post-Katrina New Orleans drama, *Treme*. *The Wire* has been likend to a realistic social novel, as in Zola, Balzac or Dreiser, transposed to the small screen. This too is the case for *Treme*, the lives of several denizens of this battered city and neighborhood told from their interlocking perspectives. It is tough, gritty and not for the kiddies, but a fascinating snapshot of contemporary American urban life with great writing, acting and music. Steve Earle and his son Justin Townes Earle make several cameos as street performers this season.

Youcat(2011). Pope John Paul II was beatified on Low Sunday, the first step in the Western Church's official recognition of Sainthood. Among the many achievements of Blessed John Paul's (his title upon beatification) long pontificate, was to promulgate a new Catechism for the Church, organized by now Pope Benedict XVI. This, to stem the disastrous tide of what Benedict would later call 'the dictatorship of relativism' in our prevailing culture. Fr. Dunbar and I both use the excellent *Catechism of the Catholic Church* in our preaching and teaching. Now comes the English translation of *The Youth Catechism of the Catholic Church* or *Youcat*. It is a recension of the Catechism aimed particularly at questioning young historic Christians. It is handsomely produced and well laid out, with questions and answers, diagrams, color plates, cross references to the *Catechism*, and margin quotations from Scripture, saints, artists and theologians. Literally the second of these quotations on the first page of *Youcat* is from French writer Julian Green, grandson of the builder and first occupant of our own Green-Meldrim House! 'Study this Catechism!' exhorts the Holy Father, 'You need to be more deeply rooted in the faith than the generation of your parents...' Amen to that, Benedetto! Highly recommended both for young and older adults.

A Singular Privilege

"Itza not routine" said Toscanini after a perfunctory performance by an orchestra in rehearsal, "'Itza not routine, itza Beethoven!" Father Ralston used to quote the great conductor in reference to the Church's worship, and this ethos stamps us still. The work of worship is never routine, never perfunctory, and every Sunday or other Holy Day is always Beethoven. What you see and hear – most of the time – is a liturgy done with dignity, beauty, reverence, without hiccups, glitches, or confusion. But like a big Broadway show, what you see - smooth and convincing liturgy - depends much upon what you do not see, the "sweat equity" of time, energy, skill, dedication, invested behind the scenes.

That is where the Chancel Society comes in. Week in and week out, our liturgy makes use of shining silver, crisp white linen, gorgeous silken vestments and hangings, supplies of bread and wine, and of course the exquisitely skilful flower arrangements that we take for granted at St. John's, and which you simply do not see at many other churches anywhere. That, and much else, is the work of the Chancel Society (whose president, Mrs. Roland Summers, writes elsewhere in this issue). Their work – so necessary to our worship – is funded solely by your offerings

for flowers at the altar.

Thus it is the singular privilege of those who make these offerings to provide the Chancel Society with the means to do its work, and thus to set forward the glory of God in the worship of his Church. Your contribution for flowers is not a consumer transaction, but an offering, an act of worship and a gift to God. Please consider making your offering of flowers to the altar of St. John's on some Sunday during the year - as a memorial for the departed, or in thanksgiving for blessings received - to set forward the glory of God in the worship of his church.

High Tech Scripture Reading: iPray Application

iPray BCP provides a way to bracket our lives with prayer and Holy Scripture at the beginning and close of every day. It was part of the genius of Thomas Cranmer, Archbishop of Canterbury under Henry VIII and Edward VI, that in the first Book of Common Prayer of 1549 he took the seven monastic offices (the daily times of prayer) and reduced them to the two services of Morning and Evening Prayer. Included with each service is the recitation from the Psalter (the Book of Psalms) and the reading of two lessons from the Bible; the first being from the Old Testament and the second from the New Testament. The ordering of the Scripture lessons for the church year is called the Lectionary from the Latin for "reading". In reading these appointed lessons, one will cover the major portion of the Old Testament once and the New Testament roughly twice in the course of the year. The Psalms appointed daily for Morning and Evening Prayer have us read the entire Psalter every month. Through this application we enter into the ancient practice of the "sanctification of time", wherein our daily lives are lived consciously in the light of God's revelation and grace, and in the communion of the faithful, the church. As one author puts it, "Because the Prayer Book understands how hard it is for us faithfully to live our communal life, it makes us find ourselves in God through the ordered meditative reading of the whole of Scripture. No other system for reading Scripture does this so completely or so well as the Prayer Book system, the Lectionary."¹ The Lectionary used for iPray BCP is that which was added to the 1662 Prayer Book in 1922. This Lectionary follows the liturgical calendar and thus has us reading Scripture appropriate to the church's seasons. iPray BCP uses primarily the text of the English 1662 Prayer Book which is in many ways the matriarch of the prayer books of the Anglican tradition. The translation used for the Scripture lessons is that of the Authorized King James Version of the Holy Bible, and Psalter is the 1535 translation by Miles Coverdale.

The iPray app:

- was developed by users of the traditional Book of Common Prayer who desired an easy-to-use application of prayer book worship.
- simplifies negotiating Scripture readings and the appropriate daily prayers following the liturgical calendar of the church, including feasts and fasts, into one, easy-to-understand application.
- offers four daily prayer offices based on the liturgical calendar and the time of day: Morning Prayer, Midday Prayers, Evening Prayer and Compline.
- is modeled after the 1662 Book of Common Prayer (Church of England), based on the ancient practice of the Church as refined by the English Reformation.
- was released April 2011 and is available for \$1.99
- may be downloaded at the iTunes Store <http://itunes.apple.com/us/app/ipray-bcp/id431349318?mt=8>
- will continue to be updated with new versions planned for the future.

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The Chancel Society

The Chancel Society is a quiet ministry whose work is vital to the church and its communicants. The Chancel Society operates under the direction of the Rector through a President appointed by him. Following the calendar of the church for color and seasons of the church year, the Chancel Society is responsible for the flowers for the altars of the church and chapel for Sunday services, Wednesday services, all funerals, weddings, festival days, concerts and special services in the church and services during Advent and Lent. Members set up Holy Communion for three services on Sunday, Wednesday services and daily services during Advent and Lent.

The Chancel Society purchases and maintains the linens used at communion, the fair linen for the altars, the priests' vestments, and the choir and acolyte robes. It maintains the silver and brass used for services as well as the frontals for the altars that have been given to the church as memorials or that have been purchased by the Chancel Society. It purchases all candles used for services and the wine and wafers used for Holy Communion. After Sunday services, flowers from the altars are taken apart, rearranged and delivered to parishioners in the hospitals and those who are housebound.

Altar memorial flowers and baptismal flowers given in memory of or in thanksgiving for loved ones support the work of the Chancel Society. It is a wonderful way to remember those who have gone before and allows those of us who work at the altar to remember. We welcome your support and service.
