Destination One West Macon Street: Meet Jon Erwin

I started attending St. John's services on a regular basis in February of 2011. I had returned from an Afghanistan deployment in late November of 2010, and was looking for an Episcopal church where I felt comfortable and with a congregation and clergy that I could identify with. St. John's was a perfect match for me. From the very beginning, I felt so welcome at St. John's. Everyone I met was very eager to get to know me and extremely friendly. As an example, Father O'Brien asked me to join him for lunch when I first met him. He invited me to lunch atop the Hilton DeSoto...we enjoyed a very pleasant meal together, and I genuinely enjoyed getting to know him. His reaching out to me from the very beginning was something I highly valued, and made me feel that much more comfortable attending St. John's, considering I did not know anybody there when I first joined the church. Since that first lunch together, Father O'Brien and I still get together to play tennis when our schedules allow us to. His outreach from the very beginning was one of the main reasons I decided to continue attending services at St. John's.

Additionally, I cherished the fellowship at the coffee hour and always looked forward to meeting new people. Every Sunday, I could count on the fact that I would meet at least one new person following the service. It was something I genuinely looked forward to and still do look forward to. I was raised in an Episcopal Church in New Jersey. My church in NJ is not as conservative and traditional as St. John's, but I appreciate the worship style of St. John's. The very first Sunday I attended St. John's, Father Dunbar had written a piece in the church bulletin about the importance of dressing appropriately for the worship service. I absolutely loved his approach...he remarked that one could worship in any attire, and that the members of St. John's should absolutely welcome any individual or family that attended a St. John's service, no matter what their attire. But I remember the piece also articulating that the attire one chooses for worship is also a sign of their reverence and respect for the Lord. It was very refreshing to read such a piece, especially at a time when the notions of dignity and respect seem to be eroding in so many facets of today's society. I was surprised and impressed that Father Dunbar would broach such a topic, and from that first service, I instantly was able to identify with the values and morals embodied by the clergy and congregation of St. John's.

I am a captain in the US army. I am a Field Artillery Officer, and am currently serving as a battery commander. I graduated from Middlebury College in 2005, and received my commission upon graduation and have been serving in the US Army since then (I have a little over 7 years of active duty service at this time). The military is often a very foreign concept for those who do not have family or friends serving, and I am glad that I will have the opportunity to teach them about my profession and help them to better understand our daily duties and responsibilities.

The Men's Forum: On Faith & Life is designed to ground men in Christ, the Head of the Body, in a systematic and complete way. There are three goals:

1. Immediate: To "gather the sheep" – Men's Forum as a gathering place for men of the Church, and a gateway for outsiders – friends, colleagues, family.
2. Long term: To raise up vocations to service of the gospel and the church – evangelist, teacher and catechist, administration, outreach.
3. General: Growth toward Christian maturity, in the Body of Christ, in the likeness of Christ. To grow up "unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ" ... "into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ" (Ephesians 4).

Come join us as we reflect on the fundamentals of Christian theology, that we might be better equipped to understand and rightfully live the Christian life God calls us to as men in our families, in his church, and in society.

Dr. Bergstrom's Dissertations

Part of my ordination process involves writing a series of essays on various topics. This is a good opportunity to reflect on some important things, and I thought I would use this space to share select reflections with all of you.

The first essay I was asked to write was on the Anglican perspective of the authority and interpretation of Scripture. That is, what authority do the Scriptures have over us as Christians, and how do we go about determining what they say? For Archbishop Thomas Cranmer, the compiler of the first Book of Common Prayer, the regular and comprehensive reading of Scripture throughout the year was the foundation of the Christian life, so that the people “might continually profit more and more in the knowledge of God, and be the more inflamed with the love of his true Religion.”

For the earliest Anglicans, being “inflamed with the love of his true Religion” was required in order to appreciate and understand Scripture aright. In other words, one who does not like God will hardly want to subject himself to what God has to say. This sort of appreciation has little to do with whether or not the Bible makes sense, logically; rather, it is a matter of the heart being inclined to receive it as true, and obey it. Claiming to agree with Scripture without obeying it is really, in the end, disagreement.

Likewise, understanding the Scriptures depends upon whether we like what they have to say. To quote Cranmer again, the perversity of heart of “them that have their minds corrupted with long custom of sin and love of this world” results in “corrupt judgment,” which produces “the stinking puddles of men’s traditions, devised by man’s imagination.” That is, corrupt judgment leads to a failure to understand the Scriptures, and instead we insert our own, made-up interpretations, which have nothing to do with what God actually said. So let us read the Scriptures with a pure heart, that we might receive and understand them aright, that we “might continually profit more and more in the knowledge of God, and be the more inflamed with the love of his true Religion.”

Backpack Buddies Need Your Help

Would you like to be a backpack buddy?

One of St. John's outreach ministries is support for Second Harvest Food Bank's backpack program, to provide sufficient food (especially proteins) necessary for primary school children. Last year, we were able to supply 48 food sacks to children at Thunderbolt Elementary. Children learn better when they are adequately fed – and an investment in good education now pays dividends for everyone – the child, and the society in which she or he grows up as an educated adult.

Unfortunately, this year, Second Harvest is having trouble obtaining their allotted SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) funding. This affects our backpack program at St. John's – we are unable to get discounted food, so our budget is no longer sufficient. We will be doing our best to cut prices by shopping in bulk and on sale, but it is hard to compete with the prices available under the SNAP program. For example milk that usually cost \$0.44 is \$0.11 under the SNAP program. Vegetable cups are \$0.30 instead of \$0.06. Multiplied many times over, those added cents add up to big dollars that we do not have in our budget.

Parishioners who can donate money or food to St. John's for this purpose could make a big difference to children at a critical phase in their education. If anyone would like to donate money to our program, they can send a check to St. John's and specify ECW Back Pack Buddies. Before donating food, please call Martha Sullivan 663-6221 to learn about the guidelines that must be followed. We are also doing a book drive (as we did last year). When we receive 48 new or gently used children's books, we will put them in the sacks so each child has a book of his own.

We have had such an overwhelming response from Thunderbolt Elementary; the teachers and children are so appreciative of the food, so please help our church continue this valuable program.

O'Brien's Orations

Frank: No, not ole blue eyes, but that other Frank. Frank Langella, that under appreciated magus of the American stage and screen. He is perhaps best known for his turn as the count in the Edward Gorey staged Broadway production of Bram Stoker's Dracula, later reprised on film opposite Sir Laurence Olivier's Van Helsing and his Tony winning turn as Richard Nixon in Frost/Nixon, also adapted for the screen. A big, commanding presence in either medium, he is one of those performers who not only prefers the theatre-as they all seem to say they do- but has consciously given himself predominantly to the stage in his over fifty year career. By turns commanding, wintry and introspective-this last especially lending brilliance to his turn as Nixon- Langella seems to have known and worked with everyone. Now in his late seventies, Langella has given us his first book:

Dropped Names: Famous Men and Women as I Knew Them, A Memoir (2012). Here Langella gives 65 individual chapters on actors, politicians, writers, directors, aristocrats and socialites from Bunny Mellon to Alan Bates, John F. Kennedy to Rita Hayworth. In some, he is brutal, scabrous and bitterly indiscreet. He definitely did not choose his subjects uniformly on affection and likeability-see especially the chapters on Anthony Quinn, Charlton Heston, Richard Burton and Lee Strasberg among others- but he is always incisive, self-deprecating, often funny and a darned good writer. But most of all Langella is sympathetic and empathetic particularly to his more troubled subjects of which there are many. The chapters on those tortured souls, Monty Cliff, Anthony Perkins, George C. Scott, Elizabeth Taylor and Anne Bancroft are particularly moving. Most affecting of all, however, are his encomia to his two great friends and co-actors, Raul Julia and Alan Bates, both taken from us too soon. In an otherwise often shallow industry and profession, Frank Langella entertainingly and sympathetically sounds the depths.

Frank and the Robot (2012) He does the same in this gentle science fiction, Langella's latest role. By the time this goes to press it will have likely moved on from the only screen in Savannah on which it was being shown-I was the only one in the theatre when I saw it. A pity, so look for it at On Demand or Netflix in the near future. It features Langella at his best playing Frank Weld, a grumpy aging cat burglar in the not too distant future, who because he may be losing his memory, is reluctantly given by his son (James Marsden) a sort of butler robot to look after him. Soon Frank and the robot are friends, and plotting together one last job. Don't let the premise fool you, this is actually a tender exploration of memory, love and self identity. You can see how Frank Langella who in his first writerly turn brings such compassion and psychological, not to say spiritual, incision to the scanion of his subjects; can, for all his faults, bring the like virtues in Frank playing Frank. See it!

Vegetable Beef Soup

- 2 pounds ground sirloin or stew beef
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 2 large cans stewed tomatoes
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 2 carrots, chopped
- 2 stalks celery, chopped
- 1 pkg frozen butter beans
- 1 pkg frozen green beans
- 1 pkg frozen peas
- 2 russet potatoes, chopped
- 1 can corn
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 beef bouillon cubes
- ¼ teaspoon dried thyme
- ¼ teaspoon dried basil

In a large stock pot, brown sirloin and onion. Drain grease. Add tomatoes, 5 cups water, beef bouillon, vegetables & spices. Cover and cook until vegetables are tender, approximately 45 minutes.

Beef Chili

- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1 large can stewed tomatoes
- 1 small can tomato sauce
- 1 29-ounce can kidney beans (with liquid)
- 1 29-ounce can pinto beans (with liquid)
- 1 cup diced onion
- ¼ cup diced celery (1 stalk)
- 2 teaspoons cumin powder
- 3 tablespoons chili powder
- 1 ½ teaspoons black pepper
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 cups water
- 2 beef bouillon cubes

Brown ground beef in a skillet over medium heat; drain off the fat. Using a fork, crumble beef into pea-size pieces. In a large pot, combine beef plus all remaining ingredients; bring to a simmer over low heat. Cook, stirring every 15 minutes for 2-3 hours. Makes about 12 servings.

*****Important*** When you make your batch of soup or chili, let it cool completely before freezing. Otherwise we may have problems with spoilage.**

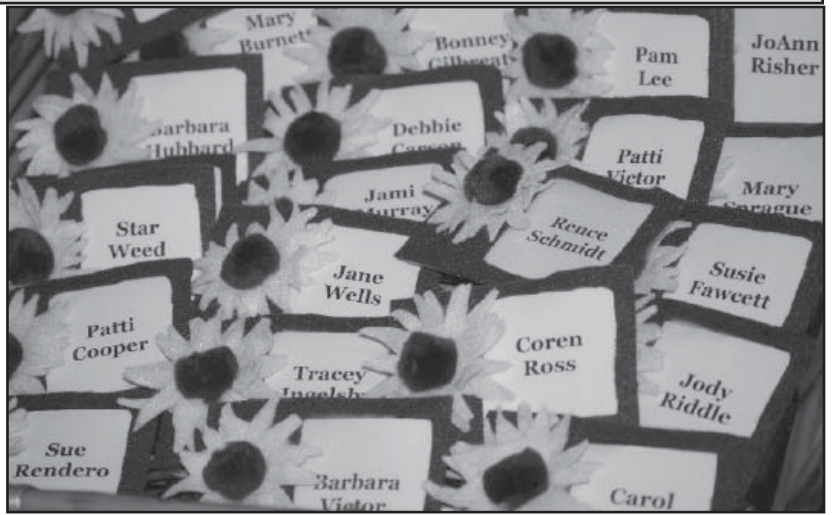
