Of course, here in Savannah, for over seventy years now, we have known that the holiday season really begins two weeks before Thanksgiving, at the St John’s Holly Days Bazaar. We also know that instead of long lines, confusion, and grouchy fellow shoppers at the mega-stores, we will find smiles, kind spirits, and a gracious welcome at the bazaar, as we shop for special items that can be purchased nowhere else. The warm camaraderie of our volunteers, the delicious food, and the incredible number of homemade, rare, and treasured items provide the fun shopping and good cheer that one hopes would be part of any Christmas experience.

Providing an atmosphere that keeps the spirit of Christian fellowship in our holiday shopping would be reason enough to hold our beloved bazaar all these years. But the spirit of charity is present in another, often unseen, way as well. All the sewing, cooking, canning, and collecting that goes into making our bazaar such a happy event is really done for a totally different reason; it is done that we might give the proceeds away to help others. Of course, some of the money will stay close to home, helping our neighbors at the Bethesda Home for Boys, the Fresh Air Home, the Center for the Blind, Greenbriar’s Children’s Center, SAFE Shelter, The Living Vine, and Memorial Hospital Jennifer Ross Respite Care, to name just a few groups we support. Some money will go to scholarships, and some will go out into the world to help orphaned and abused girls in Central America, farmers in Africa, and Native Americans in Canada. So please remember that every dollar spent at our bazaar not only brings joy to those we know—ourselves included! --but brings comfort to other children of God, in places we have never been.

Now, for those of you who simply can’t get away to make your holidays merrier attending our bazaar, you can still share in the joy of giving at St John’s in another way. The Women of St John’s have formed a new committee called “Hands-On Giving.” Of course, hands-on giving is what our women have been doing for years, whether through our Pantry Aids by taking homemade meals to parishioners, our Second Harvest Backpack program, or any one of so many activities of our women. What this new committee will be doing is offering more opportunities for our entire congregation to share the cheerful spirit of giving in a personal way, on a regular basis, all year long. Hopefully, you have already heard of our October and November food drive. (If not, please see Caroline Hayes’ article on Church School activities.) Our next drive will be to collect toys for children ages 5-17, to be distributed by the Salvation Army for Christmas. A box for your new, unwrapped toy donations will be in Cranmer Hall from Nov. 16- Dec. 14. We would like the recipients to know that someone other than Santa is thinking about them and sending some love for Christmas.

Finally, it may not be snowing in Savannah for the holidays, but you can make it a white Christmas! Beginning on Christmas Eve and continuing to our Epiphany Sunday on January 11, we will be collecting white bed and bath linens for the Old Savannah City Mission’s Homeless Shelter. White towels, white single sheets and pillowcases, as well as pillows and blankets will be collected in Cranmer Hall and by the church doors. To keep the linens white all year, the shelter would appreciate donations of bottles of bleach as well. So whenever and wherever you do a little shopping over the holidays, please add something to your cart for our larger family this Christmas. May God bless you all and give you joy in this season of giving.

## Rector's Musings:

I was baptized in my first year at Trinity College, Toronto, and became a mediocre Christian; yet for all the mediocrity of my spiritual life, there was something about the Church that drew me very strongly. Like any undergraduate, I burnt the candle at both ends; yet from my room in the “Angels Roost”, a fifth floor eyrie next to the organ gallery of the college chapel, I could and did roll out of bed at the last minute and still be on time for the 9:30 morning service in the chapel. However mediocre my spiritual life, I missed very few Sundays. Then I went to Dalhousie University in Halifax, and became a don at King’s College, where I met clergy who deeply impressed me, and before long I was secretly discerning a vocation to the priesthood. One of those priestly mentors impressed deeply upon me and others discerning a vocation the huge importance of what is sometimes called “the daily office” (because it is the officium, or duty, of those in holy orders, to read morning and evening prayer daily throughout the year). Living at King’s College or nearby, it was easy for us to gather twice daily to take part in those services. In the summers when I stayed with my parents in Mississauga and worked in Toronto, I read the office on the commuter train.

Languages are learned best by immersion, and the daily office is an immersion in the language of the Word of God, precisely so that God’s Word to us may become our Word to him and to each other, a shared and common language that unites Christians as one Body in Christ. The result of reading the daily office over the course of the years is that I have a basic familiarity with almost the entire Scripture, and in that familiarity a foundation for deeper understanding and practice of its teaching. It has been of huge benefit to me personally and to my ministry.

But it is not just for the clergy; it is a basic spiritual discipline for all Christians: and that is why the Prayer Book services of morning and evening are designed for the whole Church. That is why also St. John’s observes the daily office Monday to Friday each week, and why I have enlisted the assistance of the men of Saint John’s as regular readers of the lessons during the week. And though I would be glad to hear from other men who would like to be reading lessons, I would be even more glad to see parishioners turning up on a regular basis – once a week perhaps – to join in this basic spiritual discipline.

## *Musical Melodies*

As a child, I never understood it when my elders exclaimed, “how times flies when you get older.” I wondered how did my grandparents and their peers ever come up with such a silly notion while I waited on such things as being old enough to get a driving permit, or, not so patiently, waited to graduate school in order to live on my own, though I was keenly aware of how fast a week’s vacation could pass as our family would go to Myrtle Beach every year around the July 4th holiday. Swimming in the ocean for many hours each day, going to a different amusement park every night of the week, or taking in an occasional game of miniature golf, the time really seemed to vanish and the week was up and we had to return to what I thought at the time was a dull and boring life. I can say of my first three months of being with you at St. John’s that time seems to move very quickly, and it is because I am having such a great experience interacting with our clergy, staff, members of the parish, and especially with the members of our choir. This newsletter does not have adequate space to share so many positive experiences, so I will only share a few highlights with you at this time.

My great enthusiasm has been observing a slow but steady growth in the adult choir and the excitement that each member seems to bring with them as they return each week to prepare for the next worship service or an Evensong offering. Their enthusiasm is just contagious! We have added extra rehearsals to accommodate singers from other churches who wish to join us for Evensongs. Diane Stallings has been working faithfully with the newly formed children’s ensemble, the Psalm Psingers, and we will hear them in the context of worship very soon. I cannot wait to see what God has in store for St. John’s in the near future.

Behind the scenes a transition committee has met at least four times since my arrival to ensure the continued support for the ministry of music. We have spent many hours designing a new choir brochure, and we have in detail discussed other important concerns: the framing of future budgets and endowment considerations; starting a choir alumni association; the re-evaluation of the physical choir room space; publicity; and continuing issues about the pipe organ. I myself have tried to build relationships in our community by visiting and re-introducing myself to many of the music professors at our local institutions of higher learning. I have made over 35 calls and home visits to individuals, inviting them to become an active part of our music program and church family. I recently participated in a Halloween organ presentation sponsored by the local AGO (the American Guild of Organists) at Wesley Monumental Church, designed to turn children onto the organ and its many wonderful sounds. There were probably over 150 children at this event. Down the road, with more planning yet to be done, we are in hopes of starting both a men and boys choir and a girls choir.

In the choir music library, we have provided a tangible way to permanently honor persons or to remember loved ones through the donation of individual anthems or collections. The choir has started its own treasury, and from that treasury the choir was able to purchase an anthem in memory of Rich Mays. This anthem, *Souls of the Righteous*, by Geraint Lewis, will be premiered at our All Saints Evensong. Every time we sing, either in rehearsal or in service, an anthem that has been purchased in memory or honor of someone, the choir will be able to see the inscription and those persons will always be remembered. If you are interested in purchasing an anthem or a collection, a perfect tribute can be arranged even on the smallest budget. We have also been able to reach out to choir members and alumni with flowers, cards, and chocolates, as needs arise.

During Advent, a variety of appropriate instrumental and vocal music will be offered every Friday at a service in the chapel. In January, we will be hosting both the Low Country Piano Teachers Association with the Savannah Piano Teachers Association and their students in a program of piano music provided by Benjamin Warsaw, newly appointed Professor of Piano at Armstrong Atlantic University in the Green Meldrim House followed by a lunch. We wished to reach out to these organizations as they faithfully instruct students who will be the ones to carry out the musical traditions in not only our church, but in all churches in the future.

In Lent, we will be hosting the CATAWBA RIVER BAROQUE, a group of period instruments in concert, led by one of my professors, Dr. Murray Sommerville, a native of England who was for many years the Cathedral Musician in Orlando, FL and a conductor at Harvard University.

If you are wondering how one may support the music program in this church at the present time, some opportunities have been mentioned above, but I can think of no better way than to attend our beautiful Evensong services,

and by inviting every friend and neighbor to do the same. It is entirely possible that Choral Evensong may be viewed by an un-churched person as a neutral musical experience, but we all know that it is one of the most treasured Liturgies of our tradition, making it a great tool for evangelism. The prelude will always begin at 5:05 p.m. and will include several thoughtful voluntaries for reflection and meditation, and the service will always be well-prepared by our clergy and choir. Your adult choir has been a constant and faithful ensemble through the years and they deserve your loyal support. They will in just a short time earn the respect of our greater Savannah community. I can make that promise with the utmost confidence.

*Coffee Hour Recipe:*  
Perfect Pimento Cheese

1 1/2 cups mayonnaise  
1 (4-oz.) jar diced pimiento, drained  
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
1 tsp. finely grated onion  
1/4 tsp. ground red pepper  
1 (8-oz.) block extra-sharp Cheddar  
cheese, finely shredded  
1 (8-oz.) block sharp Cheddar cheese,  
shredded

Stir together first 5 ingredients in a large bowl; stir in cheese. Store in refrigerator up to 1 week.

Pimento cheese is delicious on wheat or white bread. You can also put it on small biscuits with a slice of ham.

## Two Events Observing the 150th Anniversary of Sherman's Visit

### Houses of Civil War America

On Friday, November 21, 2014, from 4:30-6:30, there will be a book signing of Houses of Civil War America, by Hugh Howard, with original photography by Roger Straus III. The book features the white columned mansion that served as the seat of the Confederate government, the simple farmhouse given to Underground Railroad conductor Harriet Tubman, the parlor where Robert E. Lee surrendered to Ulysses S. Grant, and dozens of other houses where the drama of the Civil War unfolded. The historian and the photographer give us a window into the day-to-day lives of influential Americans who shaped the course of a divided nation: the papers on their desks, the pictures on their walls, the slave quarters, and the grand parlors. The Green-Meldrim House is featured with ten pages of beautiful photos and a narrative of General Sherman's occupation of the house. Don't miss this opportunity to hear Hugh Howard, enjoy wine and hors d'oeuvres, and purchase a copy of this beautiful book for a Christmas present. All are welcome.

About the author: Hugh Howard is the author of more than a dozen books on architecture, including Houses of the Founding Fathers (with Roger Straus III), and Mr. and Mrs. Madison's War. His writings have also appeared in the Smithsonian, the New York Times, the Washington Post, and many other publications. He lectures widely on architecture, art, and American history.

### Christmas 1864 at the Green House

The Women of St John's are hosting a special event, "Christmas 1864," on the evening of December 3, in place of their usual morning meeting. As this December marks the 150th anniversary of Sherman's arrival in Savannah, we will give thanks at the 5:30 service that our church, our parish house, and our city were spared from destruction. Following the service, at 6:00 we will have a special program and reception at the Green-Meldrim House. A young descendant of the Green family, who is a professional pianist, will play music from the Civil War period and from the Green family songbook. In addition, some of the pieces played will be by the noted composer and Savannah music-store owner Hermann Schreiner, a German immigrant to our city. Food and beverages from the Civil War period will be served. We have collected authentic recipes, including favorite dishes of General Sherman, Robert E. Lee, and Abraham Lincoln, among others. The house will be decorated with natural Christmas greenery, as it might have been in 1864. Men and women of St. John's and their guests are welcome.

The Men of St. John's held their **annual meeting** this past September 18th in Cranmer Hall with over forty in attendance. Outgoing President John Helmken provided a report reviewing the results of the past year, the highlight being our donation of \$4000.00 to Bethesda Academy following this year's Oyster Roast. A new slate of officers for 2014/15 were elected by those in attendance with Scott Howard elected Vice President; Alex Jarman, Secretary; Holden Hayes, Treasurer and myself as President. We are honored and pleased to serve this great organization. An evening of delicious food and fellowship was capped by a thought-provoking address by the Rector reminding the group of the great responsibility that we have in our role as the spiritual head of our homes. More on that later.

One thought offered by Mark Stevens was that we seek out opportunities to assist those parishioners who are unable to drive or otherwise have difficulty getting to and from Sunday services. **Holly Days Bazaar CHILI**

(2014 revision)

2 pounds of Ground Beef	2 teaspoons Salt
1 medium Onion, minced	2 teaspoons Black Pepper
2 Green Peppers, minced	32 ounces of Whole Tomatoes, with juice
4 tablespoons Chili Powder	16 ounces Tomato Sauce
2 teaspoons Ground Cumin	32 ounces Red Kidney Beans OR Black Beans, with juice

Brown ground beef in large pot, drain off fat. Add remaining ingredients to beef and cook over low heat for an hour...or more. STIR OFTEN to prevent scalding at bottom of the pot.

Place pot of Chili in sink, surround with ice, stirring occasional until Chili is room temperature. Can be double-bagged in regular ziplocks for your freezer. If freezing on a rack, be sure to place a piece of cardboard or folded newspaper between rack and Chili bags to prevent chili freezing into freezer rack.

**Holly Days Bazaar VEGETABLE SOUP**

(2014 revision)

2 pounds of Ground Beef	2 teaspoons Salt
1 medium Onion, minced	2 teaspoons Black Pepper
2 Green Peppers, minced	32 ounces of Diced Tomatoes
1 Zucchini, diced	3 stalks celery, diced
2 Bay Leaves	6 cups water
3 cups beef broth	Frozen vegetables such as: mixed veggies, green beans, lima beans, corn (pick 3)

Brown ground beef in large pot; drain off fat. Add peppers, onions zucchini and celery and cook 5-10 minutes. Add remaining ingredients and cook over low heat for an hour...or more. STIR OFTEN to prevent scalding at bottom of the pot. REMOVE bay leaves.

Place pot of soup in sink, surround with ice, stirring occasionally until soup is room temperature. Can be double-bagged in regular ziplocks for your freezer. If freezing on a rack, be sure to place a piece of cardboard or folded newspaper between rack and Chili bags to prevent chili freezing into freezer rack.

The Cranmer Hall kitchen has plenty of freezer space. Drop off at your convenience.
