The Collect for the Second Sunday in Lent: ALMIGHTY God, who seest that we have no power of ourselves to help ourselves; Keep us both outwardly in our bodies, and inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. Amen.

Collect for Lent: Almighty and everlasting God, who hatest nothing that thou hast made, and dost forgive the sins of all those who are penitent; Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of thee, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. *Amen.*

- [omit Absolution, p. 7 – said by priest alone]
- Lord’s Prayer (Morning, p. 7; Evening, 24)

Proclaiming God’s Praise

- “O Lord, open thou our lips” etc. (Morning, pp 7-8; Eve, 25)
- Psalm(s) appointed, each ending with:
‘Glory be to the Father, to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost; As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.’
- Old Testament Lesson
- New Testament Lesson
- Canticle: *Benedictus* in the Morning (p 14)
Magnificat in the Evening (p 26)

Prayers for God’s Grace

- Apostles’ Creed (Morning, p. 15; Evening, 29)
- Versicles & Responses (Morn., 16; Eve, 30-31)
- 1st Collect
- of the Week, on reverse of this page
- or of the Day
2nd and 3rd Collects (Morning, p 17; Evening, 31)
- Other Prayers as desired (p 18-20, or 32-33)
- End with: “The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Ghost, be with us all evermore.” (Morning, p 20; Evening, 34)

The Psalms: The 150 Psalms in the Prayer Book are divided into portions to be said morning and evening over the course of 30 days (with the 30th day repeated on months with 31 days).

The Lessons: There are two cycles of lessons in the Prayer Book – those for *daily* Morning and Evening Prayer (printed here), and a second and complementary cycle of those for the Eucharist (or other principal services) on Sundays and other holy days, which are based on the epistles and gospels printed in the Prayer book.
