Mission. St. John's Church is building a community in Christ that is grounded in historic faith and reverent worship and is committed to sharing the life-transforming truth of the Gospel.

Interactive Worship. The congregation participates actively in worship, and this booklet is a guide to taking part in it. It is based on the **1940 Hymnal**, and the smaller **1928 Prayer Book**.

A Brief History of St. John's Church in Savannah

Founded in 1841, the first rector, Stephen Elliott, who was also the first bishop of Georgia, consecrated the present church on May 7, 1853. In 1943, the Green-Meldrim House, became its Parish House and Rectory. Later, Macon Street in the block between the church and Green-Meldrim House was closed and laid out as the present garden Mall. Cranmer Hall, the Christian Education building, was renovated and enlarged in 2004. St. John's is one of a handful of parishes in the Episcopal Church that continues to worship using the classical Book of Common Prayer (in its 1928 edition). We are committed to transmitting to our posterity the historic Faith and Order it sets forth, within the fellowship of the Anglican Communion.

HOW WE WORSHIP AND WHY - CANDLES & CANDLEMAS

On Candlemas, forty days after Christmas, the Church commemorates Christ's presentation in the temple forty days after his birth (Luke 2:22-38). There, by the inward illumination of the Spirit, aged Simeon and Anna recognized him as "a light to lighten the Gentiles, and the glory of thy people Israel", the Savior not just of one nation, but of the world. That's why candles are blessed and carried in procession on that day – tokens of the light of Christ, which we receive in faith, and carry to others in love, in worship and in witness to the hope that is in us. Not just at Candlemas, however, but year-round, candles are lit and used in Christian worship. In origin their use may have been mainly functional, ornamental, or honorific, but because Scripture uses the imagery of light to speak of God and of Christ, they inevitably acquired symbolic meaning also. One late 4th century Church Father says that "lights are lit and carried [in Christian worship], not to dispel the darkness, for the sun is shining at the same time, but to give a sign of joy". In their outward and visible light is the symbol of the "true light", "of which we read in the Gospel". Another early theologian, writing in the 7th century, said, "Our lighted candles are a sign of the divine glory of the one who comes to dispel the dark shadows of evil and to make the whole universe radiant with the brightness of the eternal light. Our candles also show how bright our souls should be when we go to meet Christ". The two candles on the altar, one on either side of the cross, are said to represent the two natures of Christ, human and divine. "O gladsome light" runs one very ancient hymn originally sung at the lighting of the lamps in the evening (#176 in the Hymnal): "O grace of God the Father's face, The eternal splendor wearing; Celestial, holy, blest, our Savior Jesus Christ, Joyful in thine appearing".

A Note on this Observance.

 Γ orty days after his birth, Jesus was presented in the Temple and offered to the Father, in obedience to the Law – a sign of the redemption he came to accomplish; and therefore on February 2nd, forty days after Christmas, the Church observes the feast of the Presentation of Christ, in the confidence that through his sacrifice the faithful are presented and offered unto God. When Christ was presented in the temple, his Virgin-mother was also ritually purified in accordance with the Law, and so this feast is also called the Feast of the Purification of Saint Mary the Virgin, in the hope and prayer that Christ by his grace will cleanse and purify our hearts, so that we may be presented an offering acceptable unto God. Third, when Jesus was presented in the Temple, he was met by Simeon and Anna, two Israelites who had grown old waiting faithfully for the fulfillment of God's promises of redemption. Simeon and Anna recognized the child Jesus as the Lord's Christ. They gave thanks for him as the "light to lighten the Gentiles and the glory of his people Israel", and they bore witness to him in Jerusalem. And so this feast is also called Candlemas, for today, by ancient custom, candles are blessed, lit, and carried in procession in token of our calling to the faith and witness of Christ, and a sign that to us it is given to know and love the Light of God's glory manifest in Jesus Christ, and to bear his light to others through the darkness of this world.



Receiving the Sacrament.

Those who are baptized and who have been admitted to communion (which at St. John's, is normally by confirmation, but for visitors may have taken place by some other means) are welcome to receive the sacrament. All others are welcome to receive a blessing at the altar rail (please kneel and cross arms over your breast to signify your intention).

To receive the host, please place right hand over left, palm up, at the level of your chest, and lift the host to your lips. To receive the chalice, keep your neck and head straight, and lightly grasp the bowl or stem of the chalice to guide it to your lips. For reasons of hygiene, self-intinction (dipping) of the host in the chalice is not permitted. If you are not comfortable with receiving the chalice, you may get up after receiving the host, or cross your arms over your chest. The grace of Christ is fully available to the believer by both elements or by either.

What is "Episcopalian"? (II)

Beginning February 13th I will be teaching a class for adults on the essentials of the Anglican or Episcopalian tradition of Christianity – instruction for new members, those seeking confirmation or reception in the Episcopal Church, or who want a refresher in the basics.

Last week I began looking at the question of what we mean by the word "Episcopalian". The name itself originates as a reference to government by bishops ("episcopoi" in Greek), but the tradition is much more than its system of church government. Another common description is "reformed and catholic", which grounds the Episcopal tradition in the ancient tradition of Catholic Christianity (Scripture, Creeds, Ordained Ministry, Sacraments) and the sixteenth-century Reformation.

Beginning in the late 17th century and gathering strength through the 19th and 20th centuries, there was a move away from this catholic and reformed heritage. Moralism detached works from justifying faith, rationalism accentuated human reason at the expense of divine revelation; and liberalism the freedom from traditional authorities, doctrines, and practices, and even (in its most recent manifestations) from reason and nature. Over against the rise of these secularizing trends were a series of revivals that sought in different ways to affirm the divine and supernatural character of the Christian religion. The evangelical revival of the 18th century associated with Wesley and Whitfield, built on the 16th century divines; the catholic revival of the 19th century built on

the old high church Anglicanism of the 17th century; and the charismatic of the 20th century, the Anglican counterpart to Pentecostalism, drew on the pietistic "enthusiasm" of the 18th century. Though reacting against liberal secularization, each in turn was further removed from the historic fabric of Anglicanism. The evangelical revival produced the Methodist secession; the catholic revival led at its extreme to Anglo-Papalism; the charismatic revival fueled much of the more recent secessions from the Episcopal Church. By a particular irony, the conflict with evangelicals unleashed by Anglo-Catholic denial of the Reformation heritage of Anglicanism, led to liberal ascendancy, as the putative upholders of ecclesiastical peace. But such theological and liturgical diversity comes at the expense of rootless incoherence that bedevils the Anglican world today, both in the Episcopal Church, and outside it.

At this point in the history of Anglicanism, it is not possible simply to undo all these later developments. Each of them, moreover, has sometime of value to contribute – even liberalism, which has become such a loaded and pejorative term in our time. If we venture to criticize its limitations, and especially its later decadence into freedom from reason itself and even from nature, we do so from within the liberal tradition itself of freedom of thought and speech. If we criticize its destructive excesses, we do so as those who claim the freedom that is given us in the truth. Yet none of these by themselves (much less in combina-

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tion) can provide a coherent Anglicanism: for that, there must be a rediscovery of the classical Anglicanism forged in the 16th and 17th centuries, and embodied in the historic formularies – the Book of Common Prayer (especially in its 1662 edition), the Articles of Religion, the official Homilies, together with the teaching of the classical divines (Cranmer, Jewel, Hooker *et al*). The rediscovery of classical Anglicanism's doctrine and worship will not abolish all later developments, but will give them the foundations they need, and the coherence they are not themselves capable of.
