Mission. St. John's Church is building a community in Christ that is grounded in historic faith and reverent worship and is committed to sharing the life-transforming truth of the Gospel.

Worship Schedule. Interactive Worship. The congregation participates actively in worship, and this booklet is a guide to taking part in it. It is based on the 1940 Hymnal, and the smaller 1928 Prayer Book.

A Brief History of St. John's Church in Savannah

Founded in 1841, the first rector, Stephen Elliott, who was also the first bishop of Georgia, consecrated the present church on May 7, 1853. In 1943, the Green-Meldrim House, became its Parish House and Rectory. Later, Macon Street in the block between the church and Green-Meldrim House was closed and laid out as the present garden Mall. Cranmer Hall, the Christian Education building, was renovated and enlarged in 2004. St. John's is one of a handful of parishes in the Episcopal Church that continues to worship using the classical Book of Common Prayer (in its 1928 edition). We are committed to transmitting to our posterity the historic Faith and Order it sets forth, within the fellowship of the Anglican Communion.

HOW WE WORSHIP AND WHY - THE CREED

Faith is two things: it is the faith we believe (what the Bible teaches us about God) – it is also the faith by which we believe (trust in the God of the Bible). As ancient and trustworthy summaries of the Bible's teaching about God and his works, the Creeds are touchstones of orthodoxy, reliable guides to a right faith in God. As personal and public professions of this faith ("I believe") they commit us to faith in him as Lord and Savior. As touchstones of the ancient faith taught in Scripture, they provide Christians with a means of recognizing one another as believers sharing the same faith, and so they foster charity and unity in the Body of Christ. But they are also foundations to hope and its exercise in prayer. What comes before the Creed in Morning or Evening Prayer, is the lessons from Scripture, for "faith comes by hearing" (Romans 10:17); and therefore when we have heard the Scripture, it is fit we should profess our belief in it, thereby "setting our seals to the truth of God" (cf John 3:33). "For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Romans 10:10). What follows the Creed are the prayers which are grounded upon it: for we cannot "call on him in whom we have not believed" (Romans 10:14). And therefore since we are to pray to God the Father, in the name of the Son, by the assistance of the Holy Ghost, in the unity of the Holy Catholic church, for remission of sins and a joyful resurrection to life everlasting, we must first declare that we believe in God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; and that there is remission of sins and a resurrection to life hereafter, for all true members of the catholic Church; and then we may be said to pray in faith.

PRAYER: PATIENCE

Prayer is born of despair in our own perversity allied to hope in God's promise and power. Only if we do not hope in ourselves, will we dare to hope in the promise and power of God. Yet to hope in God and to pray in this hope - requires the exercise of patience, as the gospel lesson for Sexagesima illustrates (Luke 8:4-15). As Jesus tells us in the parable, it is by patience that the seed of God's word of promise come to harvest; for there are birds ready to eat the seed lying on the path's hard soil – and there are devils of pride ready to snatch the word of God away from hardened hearts. ("Today, if you will hear his voice, harden not your hearts..." Ps. 95). There is drought in which a shallow-rooted plant will wither, and there is the weakness of the flesh that cannot endure adversity for the sake of the word: a superficial grasp of the word in cheap enthusiasm is exposed by the first serious hardship or opposition we meet. There are thorns ready to choke the growing seed, which are "the cares and riches and pleasures of this world" - that snare our hearts and imaginations. In the face of these temptations - named in Scripture as the devil, the flesh, and the world, the "three foes of man" - we can only bring forth fruit if we receive and hold onto the word of promise with patience. This is what prayer is – the patient holding onto the promises of God, undistracted by the devil, the flesh, or the world – in hope of their fulfilment.

Patience is the ability to accept or tolerate delay, trouble, or suffering without getting angry or upset. Patience is ready to wait for the fulfilment of God's promises; patience is also ready to endure suffering for their sake. Patience is a 'long obedience in the same direction'. The word is derived from the Latin verb *pati*, *patior* (to suffer), whose participle form (*passus*) gives us the word

passion. Patience is the virtue of those who carry the cross, following after Jesus, as imitators of his passion: "let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." (Hebrews 12:2). It is an aspect of hope; hope of resurrection. And therefore patience is anything but passive (though the words are related). The patience of the spiritual farmer is one of constant activity, cultivating the soil conditions of the soul in which the seed of the word may germinate, take root, flourish, and bear fruit. The spiritual farmer is in a constant battle against the world, the flesh, and the devil. Passivity is not a weapon in his armory!

In the patience with which we keep the word of God's promise, we cling to his promise with all our might and main, like Paul after his shipwreck, clinging to a bit of flotsam, waiting to be tossed by the power of the ocean onto dry land. It is this moment, when just holding on to the promise is about all we can manage, that the power of God is made perfect in weakness, it is then that we pass over from trust in our own strength to hope in God's – whose grace is sufficient for us, whose strength is made perfect in weakness.

Acknowledging our perversity in penitence, and claiming by faith the promises of salvation made to us by Christ, holding on to the promise of God with patience, trusting not in ourselves but in his power to preserve us unto eternal life: that is what prayer is. (And it is the structure of the Church's common prayers, that begin with penitence for sin, advance to praise of God's grace and conclude in petition of grateful hope.) Presuming entitlement does not pray, fatalistic despair does not pray, distraction and discouragement and demoralization fills the vacuum when we do not pray. If you don't pray, then you

don't hope — it's as simple as that. That's why Lent is a season not only of fasting and self-denial, but also of prayer that claims the promises of God set forth in his Word; and I would urge you to make the Church's daily prayer your own.

PRAYING COMMON PRAYER

There are numerous ways to do join in the Church's common prayers: – in person in the chapel, online at the church's Facebook site, with an app called iPrayBCP or at the site cradleofprayer.org. To ease the mechanics of finding the right lessons, the week's lessons are published in every Friday's email. If you find it a bit too much at first, then scale it down – one psalm, one lesson, one canticle, the creed, the Lord's Prayer, a collect. The main thing is to do it.
