Mission. St. John's Church is building a community in Christ that is grounded in historic faith and reverent worship and is committed to sharing the life-transforming truth of the Gospel.

A Brief History of St. John's Church in Savannah

Founded in 1841, the first rector, Stephen Elliott, who was also the first bishop of Georgia, consecrated the present church on May 7, 1853. In 1943, the Green-Meldrim House, became its Parish House and Rectory. Later, Macon Street in the block between the church and Green-Meldrim House was closed and laid out as the present garden Mall. Cranmer Hall, the Christian Education building, was renovated and enlarged in 2004. St. John's is one of a handful of parishes in the Episcopal Church that continues to worship using the classical Book of Common Prayer (in its 1928 edition). We are committed to transmitting to our posterity the historic Faith and Order it sets forth, within the fellowship of the Anglican Communion.

HOW WE WORSHIP AND WHY - MIDLENT SUNDAY

On the fourth Sunday in Lent, we are midway in our journey up to Jerusalem, to the cross and resurrection of Christ. It is a good moment to pause before moving through Passiontide. Today we learn that the goal of our pilgrimage is not the earthly Jerusalem; for "Jerusalem which is above", the free city of grace, "is the mother of us all". That's why this Sunday is called Mothering Sunday, and centuries ago it was the original day for children to honor their mothers. In the Bible, natural mothering serves as an image, a symbol, of spiritual mothering. The role of the mother in giving birth to her child, her care in nourishing the infant, her task of training the child and inculcating those disciplines and virtues which make us civilized human beings: all this is part of what motherhood means, and all this has its analogue in the birth and development of our spiritual life. By the grace of God, shown forth in Baptism, we have been given new birth, as citizens of the heavenly Jerusalem; but this new life of ours requires a lot of mothering, and will hardly survive without it. We need the nutriment of Word and Sacrament, the Incarnate Word, who has come down from heaven to be the life of the world, the divine "refreshment" of which the miracle story in today's Gospel lesson speaks to us (and which gives this Sunday its other name, Refreshment Sunday). We need guidance and comfort in the childish confusions and distresses which are part of our growing up. We need the inculcation of those virtues of faith and hope and charity which will make us mature citizens of God's city. We need to be civilized in God's kingdom, and the mothering that it requires, is the proper activity of Mother Church.

Annunciation

It may seem a strange observance for the depths of Lent, but Friday, March 25th is the feast of the Annunciation, the beginning of our Lord's Incarnation, his taking on our flesh in the womb of the Virgin Mary. However strange it may seem, the logic of the date is impeccable: March 25th is exactly nine months before Christmas Day. The event we commemorate this day is the culmination of a story that begins in the garden of Eden, where by disobedience at the tree Adam fell from grace, where also God made to Eve the first promise of a Savior, the seed of the woman, sent to bruise the serpent's head. This promise resounds throughout the Old Testament, and is renewed over and over again, in the promise of seed to Abraham, in whom all the nations would be blessed: of seed to David, anointed with the Lord's Spirit to reign over his kingdom for ever more. So it is fitting that just as the promise was made to the woman Eve, so the fulfilment of the promise is announced (by Gabriel, the angel who spoke to Daniel about the time of fulfilment) to another woman, "a virgin whose name was Mary: thou that art highly favored: behold, thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a son, and shalt call his name JESUS. He shall be great, and shall be called the Son of the Highest: and the Lord God shall give unto him the throne of his father David: and he shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end". In this announcement of Mary's motherhood of the Messiah, we also learn of his mission as God's chosen king, whose kingdom is forever. Nothing can stop its ultimate victory, not even crucifixion. Even now he lives and reigns and exercises his power invisibly by his Spirit among them who believe in him and in the gospel; but he shall come again in glory, and to him every knee shall bow, and death itself shall be destroyed, that God may be all in all.

Mary has a legitimate question, not of doubt but

of faith - "How shall this be, seeing I know not a man?" The Her faith seeks understanding, is not disappointed: "The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee, and the power of the Highest shall overshadow thee: therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God. For with God nothing shall be impossible." Human beings cannot save themselves - it requires the power of God; and the Savior they seek comes also by the power of God. Just as the cloud of glory filled the Tabernacle, so now the Spirit overshadowed her, making this child, conceived by the Holy Ghost, without human father, a new beginning for the human race, a new and sinless Adam to found a new humanity. Through the operation of the Holy Ghost, in Mary's womb the Son of God has taken upon himself human nature like ours, except without sin, so that he might redeem us from our sins, that we might share in his Sonship.

The Messiah comes by God's promise and power, but he comes through the faith of Mary. Just as Mary's virgin motherhood is unprecedented, so also is her response of faith. She did not say "Yes but..."; nor "yes ... if"; nor "Yes, under certain circumstances". She did not ask to read the fine print. Sinful man says "yes, provided that God acts as I expect God should act"; but Mary says, "behold, the handmaid of the Lord, be it unto me according to thy word". Here is humility, but here also is another virtue, magnanimity, greatness of soul: Mary dares to embrace what is great beyond all imagining and expectation - she dares to embrace the promises of God in faith, and in that faith she submits herself in obedience to his will. And because she dares to believe his promises, and to submit to his will, his word came to fruition in her. And so it may in us also!

There is a wonderful symmetry in this tale, between Eve who disbelieved and Mary who believed God's word, the new Eve; between Adam, whose disobedience at the tree undid our race, and Christ,

the last Adam whose obedience at the tree redeemed it (Romans 5). In her words, "behold the handmaid of the Lord, be it unto me according to thy word", we hear the humble obedience that prayed "not my will but thine be done". So it is not so strange that the feast of Annunciation falls so close to Easter. It is in the humanity that Christ took upon himself in her womb, that he suffered death and rose again; and it is by her example that we draw near to him in the obedience of faith, and are made partakers of the redemption he accomplished for us thereby. These mysteries are drawn together in the collect of the feast: We beseech thee, O Lord, pour thy grace into our hearts; that as we have known the incarnation of thy Son Jesus Christ by the message of an angel, so by his cross and passion we may be brought unto the glory of his resurrection.
