**Mission.** St. John's Church is building a community in Christ that is grounded in historic faith and reverent worship and is committed to sharing the life-transforming truth of the Gospel.

Worship Schedule. Our non-holiday Sunday schedule is: 8 a.m. Holy Communion in the church; 9 a.m. Family Worship Service (Family Morning Prayer in the church on the first, second, third, and fifth Sundays of the month and Holy Communion in the chapel on the fourth Sunday); and 11 a.m. Holy Communion in the church on the first, third, and fifth Sundays of the month with Morning Prayer on the second and fourth Sundays. **Interactive Worship.** The congregation participates actively in worship, and this booklet is a guide to taking part in it. It is based on the 1940 Hymnal, and the smaller 1928 Prayer Book.

#### A Brief History of St. John's Church in Savannah

Founded in 1841, the first rector, Stephen Elliott, who was also the first bishop of Georgia, consecrated the present church on May 7, 1853. In 1943, the Green-Meldrim House, became its Parish House and Rectory. Later, Macon Street in the block between the church and Green-Meldrim House was closed and laid out as the present garden Mall. Cranmer Hall, the Christian Education building, was renovated and enlarged in 2004. St. John's is one of a handful of parishes in the Episcopal Church that continues to worship using the classical Book of Common Prayer (in its 1928 edition). We are committed to transmitting to our posterity the historic Faith and Order it sets forth, within the fellowship of the Anglican Communion.

#### HOW WE WORSHIP AND WHY – STRIKING THE BREAST

As we sin in thought, word, and deed, so we must also repent. The mind that conceived the sin must now acknowledge it as its own, with an outward word of honest confession – no excuses, no whitewashing, no blameshifting, nor self-pity, no self-flagellation with the intention of escaping just criticism. The will that chose to consent to this concept in impurity of the thoughts of the heart, must now grieve its sin and turn away from it with inward contrition, or it will return to the old habit, "like a dog to its vomit" (Proverbs 26:11; 2 Peter 2:22). The damage done by the work of sin must be made good in deeds of satisfaction, like Zacchaeus, who vows "if I have taken any thing from any man by false accusation, I restore him fourfold" (Luke 19:8). Works of satisfaction are done outside the liturgy, but in the general confession at Holy Communion, we both "acknowledge and bewail" our sins, in confession and contrition. First, we confess our sins are objectively grievous, "offences against thy divine Majesty". Then follows contrition: "We do earnestly repent, And are heartily sorry for these our misdoings". For confession, speech alone is enough, but how is contrition to be expressed? One might look for tears; but given the hardness of our hearts, we may strike the breast three times (that is, emphatically and definitively), as a sign that what we acknowledge to be grievous in itself, and to God, is also "grievous unto us" (cf Luke 23:48). For the same reason, it is also customary to strike the breast in the Agnus Dei, once for each petition (at the word "sin"). "To strike the breast is to beat against the gates of our inner world in order to shatter them" (Romano Guardini).

#### Receiving the Sacrament.

Those who are baptized, have attained to years of discretion, and who have been admitted to communion (which at St. John's, is normally by confirmation, but for visitors may have taken place by some other means) are welcome to receive the sacrament. All others are welcome to receive a blessing at the altar rail (please kneel and cross arms over your breast to signify your intention).

To receive the host, please place right hand over left, palm up, at the level of your chest, and lift the host to your lips. To receive the chalice, keep your neck and head straight, and lightly grasp the bowl or stem of the chalice to guide it to your lips. For reasons of hygiene, self-intinction (dipping) of the host in the chalice is not permitted. If you do not wish to receive the chalice, you may get up after receiving the host, or cross your arms over your chest.

#### PARISH PAPER ESSAY

#### THE THIRD ADVENT

Advent, as the name indicates, is a season that looks to Christ's coming to the world, but the question is, which coming? For many, the emphasis of the season is historical, on the first coming: the innocence and vulnerability of the child born in Bethlehem, "away in a manger". In reaction perhaps to the sentimentality of the 'baby Jesus', others emphasize Christ's return in judgment, a time for preaching about death, judgment, heaven, and hell. It's worth noting that such competing emphases appear late in the Church's tradition; and that there is something rather one-sided about them, which should better be read as complimentary aspects rather than competing emphases. As Oliver O'Donovan says, "expectancy is predicated on experience. Without the experience you would not know what to expect or why to expect it.... So it is with the coming of Christ. ... The past event of Christmas forms the horizon of our future. Which is why the Advent season has a double aspect, looking back to Christ's coming to look forward to his coming again". Memory, of Christ's first coming, is thus the matrix of hope, for his coming again.

That is the approach of St. Bernard of Clairvaux in the 12th century. In Advent, says Bernard, "we think not only of the coming whereby he came to seek and save the lost, but also and no less of that other coming, whereby he will come and take us to himself'. Yet, St. Bernard says, "there is another, a third coming between those two... In the first Advent he was seen on earth and walked with men. In the second, 'all flesh shall see the salvation of our God,' and 'they shall look on him whom they pierced'. But the intermediate advent is a hidden one, in which only his chosen see him, in themselves, and so their souls are saved. In the first, he came in flesh and weakness; in the middle one he comes in Spirit and in power; in the final coming he will come in majesty and glory. ... So this intermediate advent is a sort of road, by which we travel from the first to the last." The double aspect of Christ's past and future comings

visible in the flesh, thus frames a third aspect, of his coming invisibly by his Spirit in the present.

That is precisely the structure of Cranmer's collect for Advent:

Almighty God, give us grace that we may cast away the works of darkness, and put upon us the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which thy Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the quick and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal...

Advent's double aspect, of first and second comings, is worked out in multiple antitheses: (1) "in the time of this mortal life" balanced with "in the last day"; (2) "thy Son Jesus Christ came" with "when he shall come again"; (3) "to visit us" (viz. 'in saving mercy') with "to judge both the quick and the dead"; (4) "in great humility" with "in his glorious majesty". Moreover, these four antitheses are arranged in a chiasmus (a sandwich pattern), with one antithesis ("humility" and "majesty") set within another ("visit" and "judge"). A quotation from the first Sunday's epistle lesson (Romans 13:11-14) introduces these carefully balanced clauses, with a further pair of antitheses: (5) "that we may cast away" with "put upon us"; and (6) "the works of darkness" with "this armour of light". At the heart of these artful arrangement is the word "now": "now in the time of this mortal life." The effect of these antitheses is to define "now" as a time of decisive importance. In present decisions – in the use of our present time, this very moment, now, not some indefinite time in the future - do we forge an eternal destiny. Now, in Christ's coming, is invisible by his Spirit in the present.

At the beginning of the Church's year – another rotation of the annual cycle – we are put in mind of the vital importance of grasping hold of the grace that is available to us in this time, in this third advent. There is no mistaking the practicality and urgency of that invitation.
