#### WELCOME TO ST. JOHN'S

**Mission.** St. John's Church is building a community in Christ that is grounded in historic faith and reverent worship and is committed to sharing the life-transforming truth of the Gospel.

Worship Schedule. Our non-holiday Sunday schedule is: 8 a.m. Holy Communion in the church; 9 a.m. Family Worship Service (Family Morning Prayer in the church on the first, second, third, and fifth Sundays of the month and Holy Communion in the chapel on the fourth Sundays); and 11 a.m. Holy Communion in the church on the first, third, and fifth Sundays of the month with Morning Prayer on the second and fourth Sundays. Interactive Worship. The congregation participates actively in worship, and this booklet is a guide to taking part in it. It is based on the 1940 Hymnal, and the smaller 1928 Prayer Book.

#### A Brief History of St. John's Church in Savannah

Founded in 1841, the first rector, Stephen Elliott, who was also the first bishop of Georgia, consecrated the present church on May 7, 1853. In 1943, the Green-Meldrim House, became its Parish House and Rectory. Later, Macon Street in the block between the church and Green-Meldrim House was closed and laid out as the present garden Mall. Cranmer Hall, the Christian Education building, was renovated and enlarged in 2004. St. John's is one of a handful of parishes in the Episcopal Church that continues to worship using the classical Book of Common Prayer (in its 1928 edition). We are committed to transmitting to our posterity the historic Faith and Order it sets forth, within the fellowship of the Anglican Communion.

#### HOW WE WORSHIP AND WHY - ADVENT WREATH

In the eastern sky before dawn, as the sun begins to rise, the deep blue-black of the night sky gives way to violet, rose, and white; and this sequence corresponds to the advent hope for the coming of Christ, the "sun of righteousness arisen with healing in his wings [i.e. rays]" (Malachi 4:2); "the dayspring" or dawning "from on high [that] hath visited us, to give light to them that sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace" (Luke 1:78,.79). That same sequence of colours is employed in the Advent Wreath, a ring of evergreens bearing four candles, one for each week of Advent, three violet (for the 1st, 2nd, and 4th Sundays) and one rose (for the 3rd Sunday). Beginning with just one violet candle in the first week, and then one more each additional week, they symbolize our growing hope in Christ's coming, and our increasing joy. At Christmas they are replaced by one or more white candles. Indeed, the transition from violet through rose to white tracks the transition from repentance to rejoicing that culminates in St. Pauls' summons on the 4th Sunday of Advent, "Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice", "The Lord is at hand".


#### THE ART OF ADVENT, FINAL SESSION

The systems at the church are not infallible; therefore, we diagnose the livestream system in advance of a broadcast, tweak as needed, and regularly have our system support vendor visit for updates and adjustments. After each service, we receive a broadcast quality report; it is most always perfect. Moreover, we locally record every service. These files are clear and unmanipulated by software. Unfortunately, the files are too large to attach to email. If you ever want a copy, please contact the church office.

We notice that when a live broadcast isn't high quality, it is often due to external factors. Frequently, if you watch or listen the recorded service at another time, it appears fine. However, and prior to watching a livestreamed service, we suggest you try the following to maximize the quality:

- 1. Check internet speeds to your location, making sure your house or neighborhood isn't experiencing slow performance.
- 2. Refresh your internet modem and router. Often, these devices become clogged with digital junk and a reboot will clear things up.
- 3. Do the same for your computer, tablet, or PDA. A reboot (cold start) may help, as those devices tend to hold extraneous data that adversely affects performance.
- 4. We recommend that you watch and listen on YouTube versus Facebook as quality is better there, particularly for sound.

Experience tells us that these steps will normally resolve any potential problems that you might experience. Then again, if you consider how many switches, servers, filters, miles of cable, software and satellites, etc., lie between the church and you, sometimes there's trouble that cannot be explained. But if you are having persistent problems, please contact the church office and we will do our best to help resolve your issues.
