## HOW WE WORSHIP AND WHY – GETTING READY FOR LENT

The practices of Lent are the three spiritual disciplines endorsed by Christ in the Sermon on the Mount: fasting (reduction in quantity and quality of food, drink, and other bodily pleasures), prayer (including the reading of Scripture), and almsgiving (giving to those in need). On the forty weekdays of Lent (Sundays are not fast days), we are asked to reduce the quality of our food ("abstinence") and on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday also to reduce its quantity ("fasting"). The fast may be broken in the evening with a light meal of plain food. In the western church, the custom is to abstain from flesh meat during Lent. The rigor of the fast is alleviated for the very young, the elderly, for reasons of health, and for those engaged in heavy labor. Such moderation is not only good for our bodies, but also for our souls. We say "no" to our bodily appetites that we may say "yes" to God and neighbor. Fasting liberates time that might be spent in the pleasures of watching television, playing games, or socializing for the discipline of daily prayer. This may be fulfilled by participation in the Church's daily prayers, either in the chapel or on your own (daily lessons are available in the weekly emailed newsletter and in the chapel and church). Fasting also liberates money that might have been spent in self-indulgence – in pricey restaurant meals, expensive cuts of red meat, etc. – to help the needy. In these disciplines we bring our lives more fully into alignment with the gospel we believe and the grace we have received.

## Receiving the Sacrament.

Those who are baptized, have attained to years of discretion, and who have been admitted to communion (which at St. John's, is normally by confirmation, but for visitors may have taken place by some other means) are welcome to receive the sacrament. All others are welcome to receive a blessing at the altar rail (please kneel and cross arms over your breast to signify your intention).

To receive the host, please place right hand over left, palm up, at the level of your chest, and lift the host to your lips. To receive the chalice, keep your neck and head straight, and lightly grasp the bowl or stem of the chalice to guide it to your lips. For reasons of hygiene, self-intinction (dipping) of the host in the chalice is not permitted. If you do not wish to receive the chalice, you may get up after receiving the host, or cross your arms over your chest.

### FASTING DURING LENT'S FORTY DAYS

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting and prayer for all — except as required by reason of age, health, demanding physical labour, or work. A light lunch and no flesh meat may be kept in the evening. The rest of Lent's forty days (Sundays excluded) are kept as days of abstinence (reduction in quality of food) traditionally from flesh meat (fish permitted).

## A Gender-Neutral God?

You may have seen the news reports about the proposal in the Church of England to develop gender-neutral language for God. It was hard to tell if this proposal really has traction or it was a slow news day, but even if it's the latter, two things are worth noting. First, that there will always be plausible reasons for fabricating language for God, but when that happens, it is not God we are worshipping but the image of our own priorities and preoccupations. The Scriptures remind us that the alternative to worshipping the true and living God as he has revealed himself to the prophets and in his Son is idolatry, the worship of fabricated gods, gods who cannot save, and who will most certainly betray our trust. Though God is most certainly neither male nor female (nor "gender-fluid"), he has chosen to reveal himself in language that is predominately masculine - such as Lord and King. Above all, it is Jesus himself who teaches us to speak of God as the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, so deviation from that language raises questions about our trust in his teaching. The Episcopal Church authorized rites with gender-neutral language for God years ago, in a supplement to the 1979 Prayer Book entitled "Enriching Our Worship". One can only savour the irony, that the deliberate omission of the language for God that Christ himself endorsed is called an "enrichment" of worship. O brave new world ....

## KEEPING LENT

Lent, as has been mentioned in the pulpit once or twice, is the church's spring training, an opportunity to get into spiritual shape by the exercise of the spiritual disciplines, that we may give ourselves more fully and freely to the service of God, and in more fruitful discipleship. The disciplines are those endorsed by Christ in the Sermon on the Mount, fasting, prayer, and the giving of alms.

In fasting and abstinence we practice self-denial for the sake of self-control, learning to say "no" to our selves that we may say "yes" to God. In particular, we are invited to keep a fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. That means going without food of any kind until the evening, when the fast may be broken with a modest Lenten meal; and to practice a measure of abstinence on the other weekdays of Lent (not Sundays), which is a reduction in the quality of our food and drink. The tradition of the western church is to abstain from flesh meat, which has the advantage therefore of a standard that is objective and in common. It's also customary to reduce the quantity and quality of our other indulgences and amusements in Lent. (The requirements are relaxed for the very old, the very young, those in poor health, or engaged in heavy physical labor.) Whatever particular practices you adopt, remember that they are pointless unless they involve a real measure of daily self-denial.

In the discipline of **prayer**, we practice saying "yes" to God, for which fasting's "no" prepares us. Less time spent on indulgences and amusements means more time for prayer, the aligning of our wills with God's will declared in his word, so that his will may come to fruition through us. Spiritually, prayer is the referring of all the circumstances of our lives to God, so that we may begin to see them in the perspective of heaven;

practically, it involves the discipline of saying prayers, especially the Church's daily common prayer. You can join us in the chapel, or online, or say them by yourself with a Bible and Prayer Book. (A leaflet with the weekly psalms and lessons is available at the church and chapel door.)

The third discipline of Lent is **almsgiving**. If fasting is an exercise of *faith* in God's goodness, and prayer an exercise of *hope* in his promises, the giving of alms for the relief of material and spiritual need is an exercise of *charity*, of love for neighbour. In fasting and abstinence we deny ourselves that we may give ourselves to the service of God in prayer, and to the service of our neighbor in the giving of alms. Less money spent on self means more money to give to those in need.

This Lent we will be taking up a special "baby-bottle" collection for the Savannah Care Center, in support of their compassionate and hopeful ministry to women (and men) who face unplanned pregnancies. Funded entirely by donations, this Christian ministry offers them realistic alternatives to abortion and provides emotional, educational, and material support for them to meet the challenges of pregnancy and parenting.
