HOW WE WORSHIP AND WHY – THE VENITE (PSALM 95)

The canticle Venite (Ven-eye-tee), which is Psalm 95, is often called the "Invitatory", because in it the faithful invite and exhort one another to exuberantly thankful and joyful worship of the Lord as "a great King above all gods", whose supreme power is manifested in creation, election, and judgment. God is the king who makes and rules all things: "In his hand are all the corners of the earth; and the strength of the hills is his also. The sea is his, and he made it; and his hands prepared the dry land". But what makes us "fall and down and kneel before" him, is that " the Lord our Maker" has by free grace also made us his own people: "For he is the Lord our God; * and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand". After these words of invitation come words of warning:"Today, O that ye would hear his voice: harden not your hearts.", after the example of the Israelites in the wilderness, who tested God instead of trusting him, who responded to his gracious love with grumbling rather than gratitude. "Unto whom I sware in my wrath, that they should not enter into my rest". How do we respond to the unmerited gift of God's gracious love? by hearing and receiving his word, with grateful faith: and so the Venite is a very appropriate invitation to the day's morning and evening prayer, which is centered on the reading of the psalms and other scriptures. It invites us both to "show ourselves glad in him with psalms", and attentively to "hear his voice", that we may be guided safely through the wilderness of this world into the promised land of everlasting life.

The New Testament Lessons: (All sit)

In those days: they which were scattered abroad upon the persecution that arose about Stephen travelled as far as Phoenicia, and Cyprus, and Antioch, preaching the word to none but unto the Jews only. ²⁰ And some of them were men of Cyprus and Cyrene, which, when they were come to Antioch, spake unto the Grecians [that is, to Greek-speaking Gentiles], preaching the Lord Jesus. ²¹ And the hand of the Lord was with them: and a great number believed, and turned unto the Lord. Then tidings of these things came unto the ears of the church which was in Jerusalem: and they sent forth Barnabas, that he should go as far as Antioch. Who, when he came, and had seen the grace of God, was glad, and exhorted them all, that with purpose of heart they would cleave unto the Lord. For he was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith: and much people was added unto the Lord. Then departed Barnabas to Tarsus, for to seek Saul. And when he had found him, he brought him unto Antioch. And it came to pass that a whole year they assembled themselves with the church, and taught much people. And the disciples were called Christians first in Antioch.

A ND in these days came prophets from Jerusalem unto Antioch. And there stood up one of them named Agabus, and signified by the spirit that there should be great dearth throughout all the world: which came to pass in the days of Claudius Cæsar. Then the disciples, every man according to his ability, determined to send relief unto the brethren which dwelt in Judæa: which also they did, and sent it to the elders by the hands of Barnabas and Saul.

Reader: Here beginneth the 12th verse of the 15th chapter of the Gospel according to Saint John. Christ instructs his disciples to mutual love, as those who he has chosen to be his friends.

A T that time: Jesus said unto his disciples: This is my commandment, That ye love one another, as I have loved you. Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. Ye are my

friends, if ye do whatsoever I command you. Henceforth I call you not servants; for the servant knoweth not what his lord doeth: but I have called you friends; for all things that I have heard of my Father I have made known unto you. Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring forth fruit, and that your fruit should remain: that whatsoever ye shall ask of the Father in my name, he may give it you.

Catastrophism

Catastrophism used to be a geological term, and it has become an ecological, political, sociological, cultural, and psychological term - which is to say, it's everywhere. Wherever you look there is room for gloom. Payments on the public debt are consuming an ever-larger portion of tax revenues that are needed elsewhere. China is spending its own money like water on its military, and its nuclear-armed belligerence shows no signs of moderating. Crime and homelessness are making cities unliveable again. Substance abuse is devastating the working class and the poor, while mental health is declining, not least among the young. The birth rate has collapsed – throughout the developed and half-developed world it's well below replacement rate or on the way there - with dire economic and social consequences long denied but now admitted to be the cause of serious worry. Even when we disagree about the reasons for gloom, gloom prevails. Is climate change a catastrophic threat – or the policies proposed to mitigate it? Is wokery's DEI agenda a threat - or the opposition to it? Democracy is under attack – but is it by the left or by the right? Are the breakthroughs in artificial intelligence cause for celebration, or for panic? Will they save us or utterly destroy us?

The list could be extended, but you get the idea. Catastrophism is everywhere. I am not of the class of those congenital optimists who airily dismiss all such fears, as if God had somehow guaranteed us immunity from calamity. The question is, which fears are real, and which responses are rational. Running around yelling 'the sky is falling' is just as useless as burying your head in the sand. Yet in the tribalism of our present debates, in which every question is instantly politicized, there is no room left for sober sensible discussion about them — another reason for gloom. So what to do? The culture of catastrophism is grounded in fear, despair,

and wrath. We must address each of them.

First: renounce wrath. Left and right, elitist and populist, we need to renounce our self-reinforcing echo chambers and their correlative demonization of the other. "The wrath of man worketh not the righteousness of God". Disagreements will not magically disappear – far from it, nor should they; but we could learn to handle them more rationally and responsibly. A little more light, and little less heat, would be a welcome step. "So far as in you lies, live peaceably with all men"; and when we fail in this duty, God unleashes his wrath on us – he gives us what we want, and he blinds us to what we need. Already we are tasting his wrath. Let's renounce the contest of screech against scream before we tear each other's throats out.

Second: renounce despair. Underlying the present wasteland of our wraths and sorrows is a profound collapse of hope. The best way to lay hold of hope is to act hopefully. You need a stake in the future: something that engages you in the long term. Get married; have children; join a church; start a business; build relationships with family, friends, and neighbours. Stop waiting for the perfect moment to start – it never comes: act now. Plant a seed, and commit to cultivating it. "Better to light a candle than to curse the darkness". I love the Tolkien short story, "Leaf by Niggle". Niggle is the artist whose masterwork - a painting of a tree - is never completed, never appreciated, and after his death is used to repair a neighbour's roof, one fragment only being preserved in the dark corner of a museum where few eyes see it before the museum burns down; but beyond death, Niggle finds his tree, not the image, but the reality. His labor was not in vain.

Third: **renounce fear**. To renounce wrath, to renounce despair, we must also renounce the fear that fuels them both, and you can't live without fear

if you think you are alone in the universe. It's no accident that absence of religious faith is correlated with anxiety. You can't resist fear of the powers of darkness unless you know that "they that be with us are more than they that be with them" (2 Kings 6:16). Faith is the confident trust in God's good will toward men, a good will which works even through evil itself. The vindication of that faith is the resurrection of Jesus Christ, whose victory casts out the powers of darkness, and sets us free from fear. You cannot expect to have faith if you do not avail yourself of the means of grace in fellowship with other believers; and your faith is not real if you are not committed to acting in the obedience of faith. But to live in faith, is to grasp hold of hope, and to let go of wrath; it gives us a space where with sober judgment we may take the measure of the threats we face, and what we need to do about them.
