How We Worship and Why – Unity in Communion

In a world where we continually experience fragmentation, division, and isolation; in which we are so often strangers to one another and even to ourselves, the purpose of God is good news: "that he might gather together in one all things in Christ" (Eph. 1:10). This is the unity for which Christ prayed (John 17:11, 23), and for which he died, who "is our peace" (Eph. 2:11-22), and is both gift to be received and a calling to be fulfilled in the Church (Eph. 4:1-6). In an age of fragmented denominations and consumer Christians, such unity may seem remote. What Christ has already accomplished on our behalf, remains to be fulfilled in us; yet in the Holy Communion we are assured of real unity in Christ, known already by faith. "We being many are one bread, and one body: for we are all partakers of that one bread" (1 Cor. 10:17). Accordingly the Prayer Book invites to pray and long for this unity, asking God "to inspire continually the Universal Church with the spirit of truth, unity, and concord: And grant that all those who do confess thy holy Name may agree in the truth of thy holy Word, and live in unity and godly love". It moves us to repentance and reconciliation, and demands we be "in love and charity with your neighbours". In the Prayer of Consecration, we ask to "be made one body with him". When we receive the Sacrament in repentance, faith, and charity, with a deep longing for the unity Christ promises us, the Spirit works within us to accomplish that unity in our thoughts, our actions, and our lives. "Soon may we all one bread, one body be, /Through this blest sacrament of unity" (Hymn 191).

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

Receiving the Sacrament.

Those who are baptized, have attained to years of discretion, and who have been admitted to communion (which at St. John's, is normally by confirmation, but for visitors may have taken place by some other means) are welcome to receive the sacrament. All others are welcome to receive a blessing at the altar rail (please kneel and cross arms over your breast to signify your intention).

To receive the host, please place right hand over left, palm up, at the level of your chest, and lift the host to your lips. To receive the chalice, keep your neck and head straight, and lightly grasp the bowl or stem of the chalice to guide it to your lips. For reasons of hygiene, self-intinction (dipping) of the host in the chalice is not permitted. If you do not wish to receive the chalice, you may get up after receiving the host, or cross your arms over your chest.

THE VIRTUE OF OBSTINACY

One of the marks of Anglicanism in its classical period (from the mid-16th to the mid-18th centuries), was the impact of successive Acts of Uniformity, requiring adherence in England to the 16th century Articles of Religion and Prayer Book, and imposing restrictions on freedom of worship and other civil penalties on "recusants" (papists) and "dissenters" or "non-conformists" (protestants who often shared doctrine but differed in matters of liturgy and polity). England was not unusual in this regard: uniformity of religion was regarded as a matter of public importance throughout Europe. Beginning with the 1689 Act of Toleration, however, these penalties were gradually relaxed, and all religious tests and penalties for dissenters and papists were abolished in 1846 and for Jews in 1858.

In view of that history, therefore, one can only savor the irony that in the very different circumstances of the 21st century, those who adhere to some form of classical Anglicanism find themselves the new non-conformists in post-Anglican denominations. That's why St John's is a parish in the Episcopal Church, yet not altogether of the Episcopal Church. We are an outlier, and have been since the mid-1970's, when the national church, moving in lockstep with the post-1960's cultural revolution, embraced a wave of revolutionary changes in theology. At the center of these changes was the abolition of the 1928 Prayer Book, the sidelining of the Articles of Religion, and the remodeling of ordained ministry and marriage without regard to the Biblical teaching on the distinction and complementarity of sex. In the providence of God, Fr Ralston was rector of St. John's at that time, a man with the convictions and temperament to mount an effective resistance, and the congregation rallied around him. When many other parishes meekly submitted to the dictates issued by the national

church, St. John's practiced the virtue of obstinacy, and declined to jettison its patrimony of classical Anglicanism – and flourished. Under his successors, we have continued to practice the virtue of obstinacy, and by God's grace I hope we shall long continue in the same.

Such obstinate non-conformity does make St. John's an outlier inside the Episcopal Church, and subjects us to occasional outbursts of progressive ire and institutional pressure that require steady nerve and fortitude to endure and resist. It also presents a risk of compromised conscience, of witness to Christ obscured by General Convention stances at odds with the historic Faith. For that reason, in 2010 we requested what is called "Delegated Episcopal Pastoral Oversight" (DEPO), as a safeguard of theological conscience: the diocesan bishop (who retains jurisdiction) delegating aspects of his oversight (especially the sacraments) to a bishop of his own choosing, who better represents to the wider Anglican Communion (and especially the churches of the Global South, such as Malawi) our own theological convictions. Bishop Benhase, and then Bishop Logue, have graciously granted this request, and appointed Bishop Paul Lambert as our (resident!) DEPO bishop. We have worked hard on being honorable partners with them in this arrangement, despite our differences on matters of faith. In more stridently progressive urban dioceses, such tolerance of dissent is rare; but there are bishops, and among them I think we may count our own diocesan, who value the presence of conservatives and traditionalists, and are ready to make room for them in the big tent. In a time when churches everywhere are losing members, a policy of extirpating theological traditionalists has little to commend it.

We are outliers, however, not only inside the Episcopal Church, but also outside it. Since the late mid 70's, many Episcopalians decided to leave the

Episcopal Church - Prayer Book catholics in the late 1970's, evangelicals and charismatics in the early 2000's - but we stayed here, somewhat to the perplexity and/or disapproval of our friends in the Anglican Church of North America, the Reformed Episcopal Church, and the Anglican Catholic Church, with whom we often have more in common than with General Convention Episcopalians. Institutionally, it's not very tidy, but as long as we have the freedom to worship and bear witness to Christ according to the tradition of faith we have received, we shall do our best under God's grace to grow where we are planted, and though the passage of years bring their changes to St. John's, the stubborn attachment to the tradition of classical Anglicanism in our younger clergy at St. John's is very encouraging sign for its long-term future.
