HOW WE WORSHIP AND WHY - THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

Because we are embodied souls, we worship God not only with our souls, but also with our bodies. When these bodily ceremonies are executed not perfunctorily but with reverence and mindfulness, they stir up and strengthen our faith and love for Christ. One of these bodily ceremonies is the sign of the cross. In the baptism in which Christian life begins, the priest makes it upon us, "in token that hereafter he shall not ashamed to confess the faith of Christ crucified, and manfully to fight under his banner, against sin, the world, and the devil, and to continue Christ's faithful soldier and servant unto his life's end". We can also make it upon ourselves, as the children's rhyme instructs us: "Head, heart, / Left, right/ That's the sign/ By which we fight". Because Christ has redeemed us by his cross, in the sign of the cross we acknowledge our entire reliance on his grace, and our entire consecration to his service. The use of this sign is entirely at the discretion of the worshipper, but the customary points at which to do so are these: when the priest makes a sign of the cross over the people, at the absolution (at Morning Prayer, Evening Prayer, and Holy Communion) and at the blessing. The priest and people may also make it upon themselves at numerous other points: at the beginning of the gospel canticles (Benedictus, Magnificat, Nunc Dimittis), at the end of the creeds, at the invocation of the Trinity, at the announcement of the gospel (three tiny crosses made with the thumb, on forehead, lips, and heart), at "Rest eternal", at "Blessed

Receiving the Sacrament.

Those who are baptized, have attained to years of discretion, and who have been admitted to communion (which at St. John's, is normally by confirmation, but for visitors may have taken place by some other means) are welcome to receive the sacrament. All others are welcome to receive a blessing at the altar rail (please kneel and cross arms over your breast to signify your intention).

To receive the host, please place right hand over left, palm up, at the level of your chest, and lift the host to your lips. To receive the chalice, keep your neck and head straight, and lightly grasp the bowl or stem of the chalice to guide it to your lips. For reasons of hygiene, self-intinction (dipping) of the host in the chalice is not permitted. If you do not wish to receive the chalice, you may get up after receiving the host, or cross your arms over your chest.





Too Many Books

This essay from 2008 has been revised.

The Stoic author Seneca (a contemporary of Saint Paul) did not approve of reading many different authors and books – or rather, the practice of not reading them, but skipping from one to another, "making flying visits to them all" but never "acquiring an intimate acquaintance with any one great writer". "Food that is vomited up as soon as it is eaten" (a deplorable habit of Roman gourmands), "is not assimilated into the body and does not do one any good; nothing hinders a cure so much as frequent changes of treatment; a wound will not heal over if it is being made the subject of experiments with different ointments; a plant which is frequently moved never grows strong. Nothing is so useful that it can be of any service in the mere passing. A multitude of books only gets in one's way". His advice: "always read well-tried authors", "writers whose genius is unquestionable", "and if at any moment you find yourself wanting a change from a particular author, go back to the ones you have read before". It is very good advice. I can't say that I live by it all the time. I like nothing so much as acquiring more books, and find it very difficult to get rid of any. Though I do go back to books I have read before, I also do skip from book to book. It is deplorable. There is one exception to my bibliogourmandizing, and that is the Bible and the Prayer Book. When I began to be serious about the Christian religion, it was impressed upon me very strongly that I should take up the discipline of reading Morning and Evening Prayer every day (the daily "office" or duty of a priest), and by and large I have done so ever since.

This has meant not only reading the psalms and prayers in the Prayer Book, but also reading the Bible in a systematic way over the course of each year, according to a lectionary (schedule of

readings). The office lectionary in the 1928 Prayer Book is not very good (it's one of its few weak points); we use the English Church's 1922 lectionary in the chapel and in online Morning Prayer.

Like any discipline, reading the office can be a bit of a chore, and sometimes leaves me bored or confused. Yet like any discipline, the fruit it bears is undeniable. When I first began reading the Bible, I often found myself puzzled and confused. It seemed rather strange and sometimes indigestible, a kind of wilderness in which one could get lost. There are still times when I feel that way! But I have also seen this wilderness turn to paradise. For an Episcopalian, I have a fairly well stocked memory of Bible passages, which I can refer to without much trouble. More strikingly, I notice the slow growth of understanding.

Passages that once struck me as opaque and puzzling now speak to me clearly and powerfully. In the filling of the memory and the illumination of the understanding, a foundation is laid for the purification of the will in prayer, which is the whole point. As Cranmer said, "In reading of God's Word, he most profiteth not always, that is most ready in turning of the book…; but he that is most turned into it, that is most inspired with the Holy Ghost, most in his heart and life altered, and transformed into that thing which he readeth".

To that end, Seneca adds this further counsel for our reading. "After running over a lot of different thoughts, pick out one to be digested thoroughly that day. This is what I do myself; out of many bits I have been reading I lay hold of one". What Seneca describes is the process of assimilation, vividly caught in the familiar language of the collect for Advent 2, "read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest". In selecting this "thought for the day" from the reading or hearing of the daily office, we choose the scriptural word to which we will return over the course of the day

through memorization, meditation, and prayer. "Lord, what love have I unto thy law! All the day long is my study of it" (Psalm 119:97). By this process, the fruits of reading the Word of God in the daily office are multiplied, and our own souls and lives conformed more fully to it. "Blessed is the man", says the psalmist, whose "delight is in the law of the LORD; and in his law will he exercise himself [i.e. meditate] day and night. And he shall be like a tree planted by the water-side, that will bring forth his fruit in due season. His leaf also shall not wither; and look, whatsoever he doeth, it shall prosper". "Thy word have I hid within my heart, that I should not sin against thee" (Psalm 119:11").
