THE FENRIS WOLF

Sometimes a pastor's job is to encourage, comfort, console and soothe: but sometimes his job is to sound the alarm alarm. That's what this is: "The Fenris wolf is loose". (For those who don't get the allusion: in Norse legend, the Fenris wolf is the power of chaos who will be loosed at Ragnarok, 'the twilight of the gods,' when the world is destroyed in fire and water.) It is a line from 'Bonfires on the Ice', a poem written by Rudyard Kipling in 1933, in reaction to ominous events in Germany - Hitler's appointment as chancellor in January, the Reichstag fire in February, and the assumption of emergency powers by the Nazi party in March. It was a warning to a Britain which was unprepared for war and unwilling to rearm. Kipling was aiming at policies built on wishful thinking, which, like "bonfires on the ice", cheer for a time, but in the end fall through through the foundations on which they are built.

We know the Mountain and the Mouse.
We know Great Cry and Little Wool.
We know the purseless Ears of Sows.
We know the Frog that aped the Bull.
We know, whatever Trick we pull, (Ourselves have gambled once or twice)
A Bobtailed Flush is not a Full.
We know the Bonfire on the Ice.

Kipling's prescient warning went unheeded at the time: as his poem itself testifies, the political community was too invested in its wishful thinking to pay attention. It's a poem that has struck a chord with me in recent years, and even more since the retreat from Afghanistan, the invasion of Ukraine, the recent terrorist atrocities in Israel, and the threat

of engulfing war. The enemies of the post-1945 order have scented weakness, and emboldened in their belligerence, are making a bid for power, at almost any cost in human suffering, even of their own people. Rather than protect their people from harm. Hamas uses them as human shields, and uses the subsequent casualties to stoke rage against Israel in the Arab world, and also in the west. And we know that Hamas is itself but a catspaw of more ominous adversaries – Iran, Russia, and China, who, like Hamas, regard even their own people as disposable pawns of their belligerence.

These are wolves, and need to be dealt with as such. Yet the political communities of the west, and especially of its indispensable leader, the USA, are rife with wishful thinking. What I am seeing (and I acknowledge here that some readers will look at it differently) is this: the zealots of the populist right and the progressive left are peddling their own fantasies, while the establishment elites, having pandered to technocratic arrogance, are now pandering to their party bases rather that seeking to build broad coalitions to unify the country. Defeatist isolationism masquerading as patriotism is on the rise, while authoritarian identity politics poisons debate and fosters conformist mediocrity in institutions, educational, cultural, religious, economic and even Then there is the military. unprecedented size of the federal deficit (for which I note both presumptive presidential candidates bear a large share of responsibility), that with the rise of interest rates is set to hobble the country's financial capability to meet real challenges. There's a word for us now: "decadence". This is precisely what

the wolves are counting on: that's why they are willing to shed their own people's blood like water, because they are sure that decadent western powers no longer have what it takes to resist their assaults.

We know that Ones and Ones make Twos-Till Demos votes them Three or Nought. We know the Fenris Wolf is loose. We know what Fight has not been fought. We know the Father to the Thought Which argues Babe and Cockatrice Would play together, were they taught. We know that Bonfire on the Ice.

'We know the Fenris Wolf is loose': I am not the only one to sound the alarm; it is what I have been hearing from a surprising number of folk. It's a deeply disquieting prospect. What does it call for? Not panic, but sober and rigorous thought about the challenges we face, and what is required to face them; not memes but self-critical clarity of vision, moral and spiritual rearmament. A people gets the leaders it deserves: and if we demand quick and easy fixes we shall get leaders who pander to that desire. In the present decadence of our societies such sobriety and clarity of judgment may be hard to find: we should be praying for it, and demanding it in our putative leaders.

As Samson did more than once, it is indeed possible that the United States may again awake, and shake off the accumulated follies of our time, as we have done before: but the example of Samson warns us not to take that for granted. Enfeebled by his own folly, as yet unaware of his self-betrayal, "he awoke out of his sleep, and said, I will go out as at other times before, and shake myself. And he wist not that the LORD was departed from him".
