GATHER UP THE FRAGMENTS

In Tolkien's great mythic parable, The Lord of the Rings, the races of hobbits and men are latecomers in a history that began long before they arrived on the scene, and whose deeper significance is not readily apparent. So one of the significant moments is when the representatives of hobbits and men meet in council at Rivendell with those like Elrond. whose memories go back to the "elder days", and who can set the challenges the hobbits and men both face in a larger and illuminating perspective. Only thus can they know what and how their own mission must be accomplished.

Robert Crouse was not of elven race, but in him the memory of the "elder days" lived on, with rare perspicacity of understanding, and a gift for imparting its deep spiritual wisdom. Born in a mill village of his ancestors, Crousetown, Nova Scotia, he was a Canadian Anglican priest; held a doctorate from Harvard: was a professor of Classics at King's College, Halifax: a profound scholar of the Platonic and Augustinian tradition right up to Thomas Aquinas and Dante; Vice-President of the Prayer Book Society of Canada (along with the great evangelical teacher J. I. Packer): the teacher and mentor of Prayer Book Anglican clergy like me and many others. He had a rare gift for concise and lucid utterance conducive both to understanding and to prayer. in teaching, his words were few, unhurried reading: Crouse knew that

Notoriously, he did without a telephone, but accepted the new invention of the fax machine, because it allowed for reflection before making a response to the questions that came his way on points of faith and theology. I have my own treasured file of faxes to the questions I posed him, and I only wish I had sent him more.) In his later years, his reputation grew, and as his students multiplied and scattered across North America and Europe, so his invitations to speak increased, and he found ready audiences not only among high church Anglicans like himself but among Evangelicals and Roman Catholics. Notably, in his later years, though a Prayer Book Anglican to his bones, he was a regular visiting professor at the Augustinianum in Rome, the only non-Roman Catholic to be so honored.

Until his death in 2011, he was a frequent visitor to St. John's, a cherished friend of this parish, and a regular conductor of the Elliott House clergy seminars on classic works of theology like Dante, Augustine's Confessions and Boethius' Consolation of Philosophy. I know he is remembered by many parishioners from that time; but along with a number of his other former students, I have been involved in a project of publishing his works, and making them available to larger audiences. The first work has just been published, a slim volume of spiritual meditations called *Images of* Pilgrimage: Paradise and Wilderness in Christian Spirituality. It will be followed by two volumes of selected sermons, entitled The Soul's Pilgrimage. These are volumes for the general reader, but they nonetheless demand a reflective.

but always worth waiting for the most effective communication often is found as much in what is not said explicitly, but only implied.

> This Sunday's gospel lesson (John 6:5-14) was one to which he often referred. When the multitude have eaten and are full, Jesus bids the disciples "gather up the fragments, that nothing be lost", an act of gratitude, but also of provision, for when they do so, they fill twelve baskets with the fragments of the five barley loaves so wondrously multiplied by Christ – enough, that is, for the twelve apostles of the Lamb to feed the twelve tribes of God's new Israel, the Church and people of God among all nations. "Gather up the fragments that remain, that nothing be lost": this spoke too to his work of ingathering the great legacy of spiritual wisdom, which has come down to us from the witnesses of Christ in every age, that it may continue to nourish the spiritual hungers of our own age, and sustain the renewal of the Church so sorely vexed and distressed in our time. Fr. Crouse's learning – his memory of the elder days - was never mere nostalgia, or antiquarianism: it was always directed to the renewal of the Church, of its faith, and hope and love for God, by these gifts of God the Holy Spirit. **GGD**
