# How We Worship and Why - The Peace of God

Where does Christian community come from? In an age of privatized religion, that's an important question. Is it something we do, or something we receive? In services devised since the late 1960's, there is an emphasis on "building community", centered on "the exchange of peace" - a moment when worshippers are to welcome one another with "a sign of peace", often a hug or handshake. Many people find this "group hug" disruptive of prayerful devotion; but the assumption of it is that Christian community is something the worshippers construct by their own relationships with one another, and is therefore more important than prayerful inwardness. It's significant that confession and absolution are often optional in the new services, but the Peace is never optional – our own relationships with one another take precedence over our relationship (in repentance and forgiveness) with Christ. The Sacrament thus becomes a celebration of communal solidarity. In the old Prayer Book, however, the worshippers are expected to come repenting of their sins, and in love and charity with one another, but the declaration of Peace is reserved to the end of the service, after the administration of the memorial of Christ's sacrifice, when the congregation is sent forth. (The loving exchange of greetings and welcomes then follows the end of the service, as an expression of that peace.) The implicit point is that community is not primarily something we do, but primarily something *Christ* has done, and accomplished for us in his sacrifice for our sins, and which we therefore receive from Christ in the Sacrament, when we repent and believe the gospel. No doubt community has both vertical and horizontal dimensions, and both are necessary: but there is an order to them, and the Prayer Book gets the order right.

## Receiving the Sacrament.

Those who are baptized, have attained to years of discretion, and who have been admitted to communion (which at St. John's, is normally by confirmation, but for visitors may have taken place by some other means) are welcome to receive the sacrament. All others are welcome to receive a blessing at the altar rail (please kneel and cross arms over your breast to signify your intention).

To receive the host, please place right hand over left, palm up, at the level of your chest, and lift the host to your lips. To receive the chalice, keep your neck and head straight, and lightly grasp the bowl or stem of the chalice to guide it to your lips. For reasons of hygiene, self-intinction (dipping) of the host in the chalice is not permitted. If you do not wish to receive the chalice, you may get up after receiving the host, or cross your arms over your chest.

# PARISH PAPER ESSAY

# RITES AND CEREMONIES: TIME

(This essay is reprinted from 2017.)

St. Paul exhorts Christians to "walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, redeeming the time, because the days are evil" (Ephesians 5:15, 16). How do we redeem the time? 'Time is money' was the mantra of the modern industrial revolution, and obediently we have labored to squeeze as much profit and pleasure out of our overscheduled lives. What gets squeezed out, so often, is time for God: 'important', but all too often bumped in favor of matters we deem 'urgent'. I am reminded of the "big rocks first" principle of time management: if you are filling a vessel with water, you must put the big rocks first, then fit the smaller rocks around them, and reserve the gravel, sand and water for last. If you start with the smaller stuff, the big rocks won't fit.

God is the biggest rock of all. If we are going to "redeem the time", God must be first, not just in principle, but in practice. That's where the sanctification of time comes in: the Christian year, the Christian week, and the Christian day: using time as a means of worship, a way of locating and aligning our time within God's timeless eternity.

The Christian Year: one of the legacies of the ancient church was the Christian year. As Christ came into time and history, "for us men and for our salvation", to suffer, die, and rise again, and as he will come again to judge the world - so in the course of the Church's year, all that he has done for us, and all that he is doing in us, becomes the very shape and pattern of the yearly cycle. In Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany, we prepare for, celebrate, and imitate, the coming, birth, and showing forth of the divine and human person of Christ, the incarnate Son of God; in Lent, Easter, Whitsunday, and the season after Trinity we prepare for, commemorate, celebrate, and imitate, the dying, rising, and exaltation he accomplished for our redemption. In short, it is Christ - "the alpha and the omega, the beginning and the end" (Rev. 21:6) - who gives meaning to the yearly cycle.

Intrinsic to the cycle of the Church's year are the

ancient system of collects, epistles, and gospels retained in the 1928 Prayer Book with minimal alteration, which provide for the principal service each Sunday or holy day a compact and coherent rehearsal of the gospel, setting before us the faith we are to believe, the works we are to do, and the grace we are to pray for.

**The Christian Week:** the narrative in Genesis 1: 1 -2:3 establishes the week as a memorial of God's creating the world. The Old Testament week ended with the Sabbath (Saturday), a day to rest from labour for the sake of worship of God; the New Testament begins the week with the Lord's Day (Sunday), each one a "little Easter", because his resurrection on "the first day of the week" is a new beginning of creation grown old in sin and death: "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new" (2 Corinthians 5:17). Sunday having become the Christian Sabbath, it is a day to rest from labour - from trust in our own works - that we may rejoice in Christ's work for us, in worship. As such it establishes the principle for all our days, that we should give ourselves up to Christ, that he may work in us by his Holy Spirit.

The Christian Day: from ancient times Christians (either alone or in groups) have prayed at fixed times. Morning and evening were the main hours of prayer the transitions from light to darkness, and light to darkness "thou that makest the outgoings of the morning and evening to praise thee" (Ps 65:8). Thus the day itself and all that we do or suffer in it, as also the night in which we take our rest, are framed and measured by the worship of God. The Book of Common Prayer appoints services of Morning and Evening Prayer to be said daily throughout the year, and though these are sometimes thought of as clerical or even monastic devotions, they are explicitly designed for the benefit of clergy and people alike. the English reformers dissolved monasteries, it was only that the entire Christian people might become a kind of monastery, a community governed by God's word, and active in common prayer. Though the fragmented conditions

of the modern workplace and lifestyle war against the unities of place, yet the unities of time at the hours of prayer can still be kept using Bibles, Prayer Books, or even the smartphone (the IPrayBCP app). It is God's world, in time as well as space, in which he works the good purpose of his perfect will; it is wisdom for us to align our purpose and our works in time with his eternal purpose. GGD
