How We Worship and Why – The Psalms

Why do Christians read the psalms in worship? Because the teaching we find spread out at length (and mostly in prose) in other books of the Bible, is here contained in a form that is more compact (and poetic). So not only are we getting an epitome of all Scripture in the psalms, we are also getting it in a form that is more emotionally powerful. They set forth and celebrate the nature and works of God, the meditations and actions of his saints, and in reading them we made ready to receive gifts of grace. To beginners they are an easy and familiar introduction, to those who have already started a great strengthening of all virtue and knowledge, to those who are mature a confirmation. The greatest Anglican theologian, Richard Hooker, put it this way: "Heroical magnanimity, exquisite justice, grave moderation, exact wisdom, repentance unfeigned, unwearied patience, the mysteries of God, the sufferings of Christ, the terrors of wrath, the comforts of grace, the works of Providence over this world, and the promised joys of that world which is to come, all good necessarily to be known or done or had, this one celestial fountain yieldeth. [Whatever] grief or disease [may fall on] the soul of man, any wound or sickness named, for which there is not in this treasure-house a present comfortable remedy at all times ready to be found". That's why, he says, "we covet to make the Psalms especially familiar unto all", why they are repeated more often than any other part of the Bible, why the people also read them, and not just the minister.

Preparing in Penitence

OD spake these words, and said: I am the LORD thy God; Thou shalt have none other gods but me. Answer: *Lord, have mercy upon us, and incline our hearts to keep this law.*

Receiving the Sacrament.

Those who are baptized, have attained to years of discretion, and who have been admitted to communion (which at St. John's, is normally by confirmation, but for visitors may have taken place by some other means) are welcome to receive the sacrament. All others are welcome to receive a blessing at the altar rail (please kneel and cross arms over your breast to signify your intention).

To receive the host, please place right hand over left, palm up, at the level of your chest, and lift the host to your lips. To receive the chalice, keep your neck and head straight, and lightly grasp the bowl or stem of the chalice to guide it to your lips. For reasons of hygiene, self-intinction (dipping) of the host in the chalice is not permitted. If you do not wish to receive the chalice, you may get up after receiving the host, or cross your arms over your chest.

PARISH PAPER ESSAY

SELF Examination (III)

The Exhortation in the Prayer Book instructs us to "examine your lives and conversations by the rule of God's commandments" with a view not to ticking boxes or earning points in a program of self-improvement but rather that our eyes may be opened to our faults and failures, with a view to being delivered *from* guilt and fear by the grace of God, and delivered *into* an entirely new motivational structure of gratitude and love. The point is not to engage in legalistic self-justification, looking for excuses and loopholes, or to minimize the wrath and displeasure of the Creator at our misuse of his creatures, but to see ourselves as God sees us, as sinners in desperate need of grace. If you have no sins to repent of, no wrath to appease, then the blood of Christ was shed in vain

As a practical aid, here are questions for self-examination based on the first table of the law, the commandments that teach us our duty to God and to those God has set in authority over us – the duty summed up by the great Commandment, to "love the Lord thy God, with all thy heart, with all thy soul, and with all thy might" (Deuteronomy 6:5 cf Luke 10:27, Matthew 22:37). The duties of the second table will follow next week.

- 1. I am the LORD thy God; Thou shalt have none other gods but me. Do I give my loyalty to false gods success, money, lifestyle, prestige, pleasure, power, ideology, party, tribe, nation? Have I lived my life as if God did not exist? Where do I put my whole trust and hope for salvation? Have I despaired of God's mercy? Have I cynically presumed upon it, and allowed myself to go on in sin? Have I rendered thanks for all good things, or taken them as my due? Do I love God with all my heart, and above all things?
- 2. Thou shalt not make to thyself any graven image, nor the likeness of any thing that is in heaven above, or in the earth beneath, or in the water under the earth; thou shalt not bow down to

- them, nor worship them. Do I seek to know, love, serve, and worship God has he has revealed himself by the Scriptures' testimony to Christ, who is the true image of God? Am I diligent in reading the Scriptures and being instructed in the faith? Or do I serve and worship gods made in the image of my own needs and greeds?
- 3. Thou shalt not take the Name of the LORD thy God in vain. Do I speak and act in such a manner that the name of God, and all that bears his name his will, word, works, teaching, sacraments, church and people are dishonored or held in contempt? Have I kept the promises made in his name of baptism, marriage, ordination, public service? Am I diligent to call on the Lord in the name of his Son, joining in the common prayers of the Church, aligning my will with his in all things? Have I exercised hope of God in prayer, or have I given way to despair or presumption of his grace?
- 4. Remember that thou keep holy the Sabbath-day. Do I worship God with his church every Sunday and Holy Day except when prevented by compelling reason of necessity or charity? Do I work diligently on the other six other six days so that I may worship God on the Lord's Day? Or do I allow my work and play to deprive God of his worship? When in the house of God, do I sing, pray, and listen to the word of God with all my heart? Do I prepare myself to receive the sacraments with repentance and faith? Do I rest from my own works to rest in Christ's work for me?
- 5. Honour thy father and thy mother. Do I show respect in thought, word, and behavior toward my parents or in-laws, teachers and pastors, and the civil authorities? Do I listen with respect to their advice and counsel? Do I pray for them, and for the gifts of wisdom, justice, and courage? Do I do what I can to provide for their needs when they are in distress? Do I pay my taxes faithfully, and perform other duties of a citizen? Do I uphold the rule of law? Have I indulged

in reckless abuse of the governing authorities and the constitution? Am I teaching my children to respect their elders and to do their duty to their church and country under God? Have I been careful to bring up my children in the faith and obedience of Christ?

After searching your conscience with rigorous honesty, it is important to bring your failures to God, with a heartfelt "Lord have mercy upon us", or using the general Confession at Morning or Evening Prayer. Remember that he has never cast off any that came to him with a penitent heart: through repentance alone do we lay hold of his great mercy. (To be continued) GGD
