HOW WE WORSHIP AND WHY - DOXOLOGY

Doxology, the giving of praise, is everywhere in Christian worship - and so is eucharistia, the giving of thanks. The heart of all doxology and eucharistia in Christian worship is the service we call "the Eucharist", "this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving", the sacramental memorial of Christ's sacrifice for our sins - a moment which finds its fitting expression in the post-communion singing of the Gloria in excelsis. Yet the older liturgies always provided for an extension of eucharistic praise and thanksgiving outside the bounds of the office (the old Missals provided a service of thanksgiving to be said after the Mass is over). They recognized a need for doxology and eucharistia which the Eucharist itself cannot meet, and it is this need which the offices of Morning and Evening Prayer supply, especially when they are celebrated not with the weekday austerity of "two or three gathered in thy name" but by the entire congregation with music, ceremony, vestment, ornament, and festivity. Morning and Evening Prayer is a eucharistic liturgy; not a displacement of the eucharistic sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving but its extension to fuller dimensions that frame the whole of our lives. The Eucharist is the center and heart of Christian worship, but it is not the whole of Christian worship, and when we reduce corporate worship to the sacrament alone we are diminishing the fullness of worship that is transmitted to us in the catholic and reformed tradition.

Parish Paper Essay

SELF-Examination (IV)

Last week I provided a questionnaire to use for examination of conscience based on the first Table of the Law, our duty towards God. Now the second Table of the Law, our duty toward our neighbour, summed up in the commandment to "love thy neighbour as thyself" (Lev. 19:18, cf Luke 10:27; Matt. 22:39 et al.)

As I noted before, the aim of self-examination is not to engage in legalistic self-justification, looking for excuses and loopholes, or to minimize the wrath and displeasure of God at our misusings of his gifts, but to see ourselves in some measure as God sees us, as sinners in desperate need of grace, with a view to being delivered by his grace from a relationship with God that is governed by guilt and fear and into a relationship governed by gratitude and love. Unless we accept how little claim we have on his grace, unless we know how grievously we have offended against the Majesty of God, we shall not be capable of gratitude, only of entitlement.

- 6. Thou shalt do no murder. Do I give myself to envy, hatred, revenge, malicious delight in the faults and misfortunes of others? Do I do what is within my power to preserve the life, health, and safety of my neighbour? Do I show the proper respect for the lives of others, as those are made in the image of God? Do I discount the dignity of the unborn, the mentally disabled, convicts, addicts, alcoholics, the mentally ill, the homeless, the elderly? Do I love my neighbour as myself, seeking their true good, or do I use them for my own ends? Do I cultivate resentments, bitterness, grievances, quarrels? Have I indulged in fits of rage? When insulted or injured, have I been ready to make peace and to forgive, or do I harbor hatred and revenge?
- 7. Thou shalt not commit adultery. Do I regard sexuality as a means to my own pleasure, power, or profit, or as the gift of God for marriage and procreation? Do I commit adultery in my heart by entertaining lustful fantasies or exposing myself to lustful desires and looks? Am I developing an unhealthy relationship with another person? Have I been

faithful to my spouse in thought, word, and deed? Have I sought to cultivate self-control by self-denial in food, drink, and other pleasures, such as screen time?

- **8.** Thou shalt not steal. Do I work as I am able to provide for myself and my own, and for those in need? Am I honest in my business dealings, and do I honor my promises and contracts? Do I repay my debts, or run up debts I cannot repay? Am I extravagant or stingy? Do I give my employer my diligent service worthy of the wages I am paid? Do I give in proportion to my means to the Church for the ministry of the gospel? In dealings with others have I been guilty of fraud, extortion, or bribery?
- 9. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour. Have I slandered the good name of my neighbor? Have I concealed the truth when I should have spoken? Have I violated a confidence? Have I been guilty of gossip or slander? Have I failed to defend others when wrongly accused? Have I borne false witness in a court of law? Have I boasted of myself or of those connected to me? Do I speak the truth in love?
- 10. Thou shalt not covet. Have I been guilty of discontent, of envy and self-pity, when I look at the prosperity of others? Can I rejoice at their prosperity? Do I ever have a "keeping up with the Joneses" mentality? Do I give thanks for what I have? Am I content with what I have? Am I driven by greed and ambition at the expense of justice and religion, of my neighbour's welfare and my own soul?

After you have uncovered your guilt, there are three steps to take to convert that knowledge into positive change. First, confess your sin to God. Acknowledge what you have done as sin worthy of judgment, and that you have done it, and do so with full purpose of amendment of life and prayer for grace to do so: "Lord have mercy upon me, and incline my heart to keep this law".

Second, cultivate a spirit of contrition. You want

to alienate your affections from sin, you want to find the idea of returning to old sins loathsome. "The remembrance of them is grievous unto us; the burden of them is intolerable". To that end, consider where the gratification of base passions has brought you — into abuse of God's gifts, into alienation from God and man, into fear and self-disgust: "Th' expense of spirit in a waste of shame" (Sonnet 129).

Third, make restitution or reparation ("satisfaction") by word or deed, to the utmost of your powers, for the harm you have done to others; "and be likewise ready to forgive others who have offended you, as ye would have forgiveness of your offences at God's hand" (p. 87). And if you can't quiet your conscience by this means, the clergy stand ready to hear your confession, and to pronounce the absolution of your sins by the authority committed to them.
