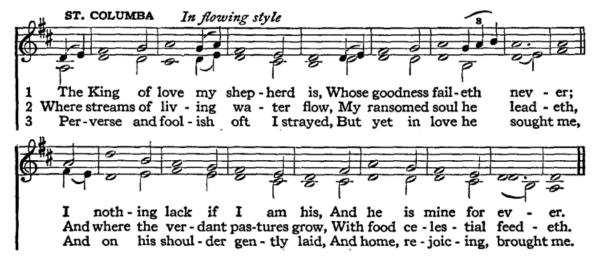
How We Worship and Why – The Form of Delivery

When the priest delivers the elements of bread and wine to the communicants, he recites a form of words, sometimes called the "form of administration" or "form of delivery". The first sentence follows an ancient tradition. It is a declaration of what it is that we objectively receive "after an heavenly and spiritual manner" in the Sacrament - the very same "Body and Blood of Christ, which was given for thee" upon the cross - and of what benefits it imparts - to "preserve thy body and soul unto everlasting life". (John 6:32, 51, 54). The second sentence echoes the words of Jesus himself at the Last Supper (1 Corinthians 11:24, 25): "Take and eat this in remembrance that Christ died for thee"; "Drink this in remembrance that Christ died for thee" - but adds to them an exhortation to faithful and grateful reception of the Sacrament: "feed on him in thy heart by faith with thanksgiving", "and be thankful". If the first sentence declared what we receive - the Body and Blood of Christ; the second sentence direct us how to receive it to our benefit - by faith, and grateful remembrance. Notice that in both sentences appear the words "for thee" - which means "for you personally and individually". The gracious promises of Christ are broadcast generally in the word of God; but in the sacraments, they are applied to specific individuals, to the strengthening and confirming of our faith. Christ gave his life for many - yes - but did he give his life for me? In the face of our flickering faith, the sacraments speak powerfully to assure and comfort us of the security that is ours in Christ.

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

THE EPISTLE: 1 St. Peter 2:19 The example of the Good Shepherd

Clerk: The Epistle is written in the 2nd chapter of the first Epistle General of St. Peter, beginning at the 19th verse.

BELOVED: This is thankworthy, if a man for conscience toward God endure grief, suffering wrongfully. For what glory is it, if, when you sin and are beaten for it, you shall take it patiently? but if, when you do well, and suffer for it, you take it patiently, this is acceptable with God. For to this you have been called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that you should follow his steps. He did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth: who, when he was reviled, reviled not in return; when he suffered, he threatened not: but committed himself to him that judges justly: He bore our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: By his wounds you have been healed. For you were as sheep going astray: but have now returned unto the Shepherd and Bishop of your souls.

Clerk: Here endeth the Epistle.

THE GOSPEL: (please stand) St. John 10: 11 The sacrifice of the Good Shepherd Priest. The Holy ♣ Gospel according to St. John, in the 10th chapter, beginning at the 11th verse.

Answer: Glory be to thee, O Lord.

A T that time: Jesus said to the Pharisees: I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep. But he that is an hireling, and not the shepherd, whose own the sheep are not, seeth the wolf coming, and leaveth the sheep, and fleeth: and the wolf catcheth them, and scattereth the sheep. The hireling fleeth, because he is an hireling, and careth not for the sheep. I am the good shepherd, and know my sheep, and am known of mine. As the Father knoweth me, even so know I the Father: and I lay down my life for the sheep. And other sheep I have, which are not of this fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice; and there shall be one flock, and one shepherd.

Answer: Praise be to thee, O Christ.

The Nicene Creed (said by all standing)

I BELIEVE in one God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, And of all things visible and invisible: And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God; Begotten of his Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, Very God of very God; Begotten, not made; Being of one substance with the Father; By whom all things were made: Who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven, And was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary, And was made man: And was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate; He suffered and was buried: And the third day he rose again according to the Scriptures: And ascended into heaven, And sitteth on the right hand of the Father: And he shall come again, with glory, to judge both the quick and the dead; Whose kingdom shall have no end.

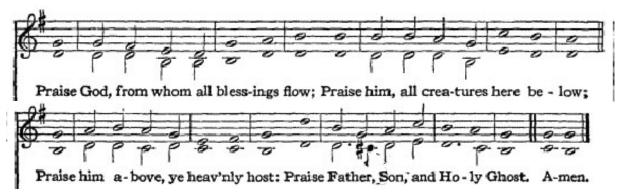

The Prayer for Christ's Church (All remain kneeling through to communion)

Minister: Let us pray for the whole state of Christ's Church.

A LMIGHTY and everliving God, who by thy holy Apostle hast taught us to make prayers, and supplications, and to give thanks for all men; We humbly beseech thee most mercifully to accept our [alms and] oblations, and to receive these our prayers, which we offer unto thy Divine Majesty; beseeching thee to inspire continually the Universal Church with the spirit of truth, unity, and concord: And grant that all those who do confess thy holy Name may agree in the truth of thy holy Word, and live in unity and godly love.

We beseech thee also, so to direct and dispose the hearts of all Christian Rulers, that they may truly and impartially administer justice, to the punishment of wickedness and vice, and to the maintenance of thy true religion, and virtue.

Give grace, O heavenly Father, to all Bishops and other Ministers, that they may, both by their life and doctrine, set forth thy true and lively Word, and rightly and duly administer thy holy Sacraments.

And to all thy People give thy heavenly grace; and especially to this congregation here present; that, with meek heart and due reverence, they may hear, and receive thy holy Word; truly serving thee in holiness and righteousness all the days of their life.

And we most humbly beseech thee, of thy goodness, O Lord, to comfort and succour all those who, in this transitory life, are in trouble, sorrow, need, sickness, or any other adversity.

And we also bless $\ ^{\ }$ thy holy Name for all thy servants departed this life in thy faith and fear; beseeching thee to grant them continual growth in thy love and service, and to give us grace so to follow their good examples, that with them we may be partakers of thy heavenly kingdom. Grant this, O Father, for Jesus Christ's sake, our only Mediator and Advocate. *Amen.*

The Preparation for Communion

Then shall the Priest say to those who come to receive the Holy Communion,

YE who do truly and earnestly repent you of your sins, and are in love and charity with your neighbours, and intend to lead a new life, following the commandments of God, and walking from henceforth in his holy ways; Draw near with faith, and take this holy Sacrament to your comfort; and make your humble confession to Almighty God, devoutly kneeling.

A LMIGHTY God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Maker of all things, Judge of all men; We acknowledge and bewail our manifold sins and wickedness, Which we, from time to time, most grievously have committed, By thought, word, and deed, Against thy Divine Majesty, Provoking most justly thy wrath and indignation against us. We do earnestly repent, And are heartily sorry for these our misdoings; The remembrance of them is grievous unto us; The burden of them is intolerable. Have mercy upon us, Have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; For thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, Forgive us all that is past; And grant that we may ever hereafter Serve and please thee In newness of life, To the honour and glory of thy Name; Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then shall the Priest stand up, and turning to the People, say,

A LMIGHTY God, our heavenly Father, who of his great mercy hath promised forgiveness of sins to all those who with hearty repentance and true faith turn unto him; Have mercy upon you; parXdon and deliver you from all your sins; confirm and strengthen you in all goodness; and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Then shall the Priest say, Hear what comfortable words our Saviour Christ saith unto all who truly turn to him.

OME unto me, all ye that travail and are heavy laden, and I will refresh you. (Matthew 11:28)

So God loved the world, that he gave his only-begotten Son, to the end that all that believe in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. (St. John 3:16)

Hear also what Saint Paul saith.

This is a true saying, and worthy of all men to be received, That Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners. (1 Timothy 1:15)

Hear also what Saint John saith.

If any man sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; and he is the Propitiation for our sins. (1 St. John 2:1, 2)

After which the Priest shall proceed, saying,

Minister: The Lord be with you *Answer:* **And with thy spirit.**

Minister: Lift up your hearts. Answer: We lift them up unto the Lord.

Minister: Let us give thanks unto our Lord God. Answer: It is meet and right so to do.

IT is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, O Lord, Holy Father, Almighty, Everlasting God.

THEREFORE with Angels and Archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we laud and magnify thy glorious Name; evermore praising thee, and saying,

Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord: Hosanna in the highest.

The Prayer of Consecration

A LL glory be to thee, Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for that thou, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption; who made there (by his one oblation of himself once offered) a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again: For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took Bread; and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you; Do this in remembrance of me. Likewise, after supper, he took the Cup; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of this; for this is my Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins; Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me.

WHEREFORE O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of thy dearly beloved Son our Saviour Jesus Christ, we, thy humble servants, do celebrate and make here before thy Divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; rendering unto thee most hearty thanks for the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same.

A ND we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us; and, of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness, mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion. And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee, that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him. And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice; yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service; not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offences, through Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honour and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. Amen.

And now, as our Saviour Christ hath taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven, Hallowed be thy Name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, on earth, As it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, As we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, But deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

WE do not presume to come to this thy Table, O merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in thy manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under thy Table. But thou art the same Lord, whose property is always to have mercy: Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of thy dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink his blood, that our sinful bodies may be made clean by his Body, and our souls washed through his most precious Blood, and that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. Receiving the Sacrament.

Those who are baptized and who have been admitted to communion (which at St. John's, is normally by confirmation, but for visitors may have taken place by some other means) are welcome to receive the sacrament. All others are welcome to receive a blessing at the altar rail (please kneel and cross arms over your breast to signify your intention).

To receive the host, please place right hand over left, palm up, at the level of your chest, and lift the host to your lips. To receive the chalice, keep your neck and head straight, and lightly grasp the bowl or stem of the chalice to guide it to your lips. For reasons of hygiene, self-intinction (dipping) of the host in the chalice is not permitted. If you are not comfortable with receiving the chalice, you may get up after receiving the host, or cross your arms over your chest. The grace of Christ is fully available to the believer by both elements or by either.

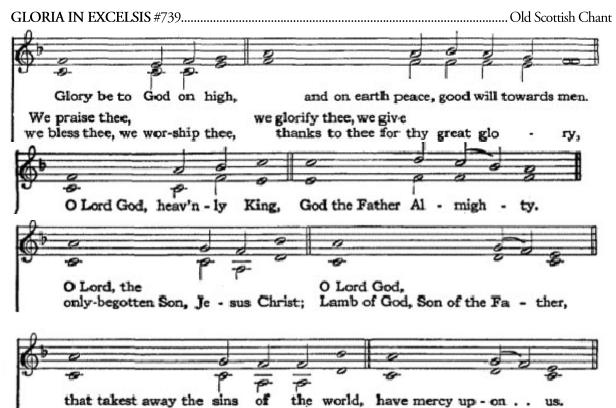

Eating and Drinking

In Acts 23:12-14, we hear of a conspiracy of forty men, who had "bound themselves by a great curse", not to eat or drink until they had killed Paul. Oddly enough, it is a detail that illuminates a feature of the gospels – that they never (almost never) show us Jesus engaged in eating or drinking. There is no suggestion that he did not need to eat and drink: to the contrary, it is implied that eating and drinking were normal activities for him, which is just what we should expect of someone truly human, and truly embodied, as Jesus was. So for instance, we are told he fasted in the desert – which implies that he was not fasting before - and that it was a real temptation to him to turn stones into bread; and he is frequently present at meals, either as guest or host. But there is never (almost never) any report of his eating and drinking anything, even if he must actually have done so. The fact that there is never (almost never) any report of his eating and drinking is not, I suspect, without theological significance.

What this significance might be is made explicit in the 4th chapter of John. When the disciples return with food from the city of Sychar to Jacob's well where they had left Jesus, they urge him to eat; and when he replies, "I have meat [that is, food] to eat that ye know not of', they ask each other, "Hath any man brought him ought to eat?" Jesus clarifies what he means: "My meat [food] is to do the will of him that sent me, and to finish his work" (John 4:31-34). Like the forty men who had bound themselves with a curse to kill Paul, the abstention from food and drink is a sign of devotion to his own mission. In the case of Jesus, however, the mission is not to kill his enemies, but to sustain life in others. Indeed, one of most characteristic miracles - the only one recounted in all four gospels - is the miraculous provision of bread and fishes in the wilderness.

The food and drink that he provides, however, is not provision for the belly and its appetites. "Labour not for the meat which perisheth" (John 6:29). The earthly paradise of gratified appetites promised by

Marxism and delivered by Capitalism is not the paradise he promises. The food he provided for the body is a sign of the true food and drink of the soul, which we receive by faith alone: "I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on me shall never thirst" (6:35). Moreover the food and drink he provides are not other than himself: "I am the living bread which came down from heaven: if any man eat of this bread, he shall live for ever: and the bread that I will give is my flesh, which I will give for the life of the world" (6:51). "Whoso eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, hath eternal life; and I will raise him up at the last day" (6:54). "He that eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, dwelleth in me, and I in him" (6:56). The consummation of his mission is to provide spiritual food and drink by means of his own death on the cross. In the Lord's Supper, we truly this spiritual food and drink. partake in

In the accounts of Christ's death, it is drink that becomes more prominent than solid food. In Luke's account of the last supper, Jesus says to his disciples "With desire I have desired to eat this passover with you before I suffer: for I say unto you, I will not any more eat thereof, until it be fulfilled in the kingdom of God. And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and said, Take this, and divide it among yourselves: for I say unto you, I will not drink of the fruit of the vine, until the kingdom of God shall come" (22:16-18). At the Passover meal, of course he must have eaten and drunk – but what we hear is the fast from food and drink until his mission is accomplished – in the coming of the kingdom of God. But that requires he drink of the cup of wrath, about which he prays in the garden: "Father, if thou be willing, remove this cup from me" - the cup of God's wrath -"nevertheless not my will, but thine, be done" (Luke 22:42). On the cross "they gave him to drink wine mingled with myrrh" (to deaden the pain): "but he received it not" (Mark 15:23) - he is going to drink the bitter cup of wrath to the dregs. Yet after his cry and filled it with vinegar, and put it on a reed, and gave him to drink" (Mt 27:48). John reports, that at this point, "Jesus knowing that all things were now accomplished, that the scripture might be fulfilled, saith, I thirst. Now there was set a vessel full of vinegar: and they filled a spunge with vinegar, and put it upon hyssop, and put it to his mouth. When Jesus therefore had received the vinegar, he said, It is finished" (John 19:28-30). This single direct report of Jesus receiving something to drink is a sign the cup of wrath has been drunk to the dregs. In his resurrection, Jesus appears to two disciples, and is recognized by them, "in the breaking of bread", in his characteristic act of hospitality; yet it is only that same evening, when he appears to the assembly of the disciples, that he asks for and eats before them "a piece of a broiled fish, and of an honeycomb" (24:42, 43), proof he is not a ghost, but the risen Lord, whose mission is now done.

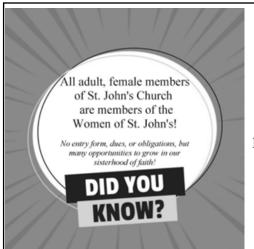
