HOW WE WORSHIP AND WHY-PRESENTATION OF CHRIST

Forty days after his birth, Jesus was presented in the Temple and offered to the Father, in obedience to the Law – a sign of the redemption he came to accomplish; and therefore on February 2nd, forty days after Christmas, the Church observes the feast of the *Presentation of Christ*, in the confidence that through his sacrifice the faithful are presented and offered unto God. When Christ was presented in the temple, his Virgin-mother was also ritually purified in accordance with the Law, and so this feast is also called the Feast of the *Purification of Saint Mary the Virgin*, in the hope and prayer that Christ by his grace will cleanse and purify our hearts, so that we may be presented an offering acceptable unto God. Third, when Jesus was presented in the Temple, he was met by Simeon and Anna, two Israelites who had grown old waiting faithfully for the fulfillment of God's promises of redemption. Simeon and Anna recognized the child Jesus as the Lord's Christ. They gave thanks for him as the "light to lighten the Gentiles and the glory of his people Israel", and they bore witness to him in Jerusalem. And so this feast is also called *Candlemas*, for today, by ancient custom, candles are blessed, lit, and carried in procession in token of our calling to the faith and witness of Christ, and a sign that to us it is given to know and love the Light of God's glory manifest in Jesus Christ, and to bear his light to others through the darkness of this world.

Receiving the Sacrament. Those who are baptized, have attained to years of discretion, and who have been admitted to communion (which at St. John's, is normally by confirmation, but for visitors may have taken placeby some other means) are welcome to receive the sacrament. All others are welcome to receive a blessing at the altar rail (please kneel and cross arms over your breast to signify your intention).

To receive the host, please place right hand over left, palm up, at the level of your chest, and lift the host to your lips. To receive the chalice, keep your neck and head straight, and lightly grasp the bowl or stem of the chalice to guide it to your lips. For reasons of hygiene, self-intinction (dipping) of the host in the chalice is not permitted. If you do not wish to receive the chalice, you may get up after receiving the host, or cross your arms over your chest.

A LIGHT FOR THE GENTILES

This Sunday is Candlemas, the feast of Christ's Presentation in the Temple, and the Purification of his mother the Virgin Mary, and at 11 a.m. we will keep the feast with the ancient ceremony of blessing and carrying lighted candles in procession. (The procession with lighted candles will also follow with a Choral Evensong at 5 p.m.). Inspired by Simeon's recognition of Jesus as "a light to lighten the Gentiles, and the glory of thy people Israel" (Luke 2:32), the ceremony symbolizes our receiving of the light of Christ in faith and worship, and our bearing that light to others in love and witness. The light of the Incarnate Son of God is indeed manifested to us (for Christ is "the glory of thy people Israel", the insiders), but on the condition that we manifest it to others (for Christ is "a light to lighten the Gentiles", the outsiders). This treasure is ours - ours to receive (in faith), and also ours to share (in charity). If we receive the gift, we are committed by that act to sharing it: indeed, it is in the sharing of it that we know we have received it. Charity is the fruit of faith, and the sign that we have received his grace.

In the beauty of this ancient ceremony we perceive by our senses the radiance of the truth that is revealed to our minds in the gospel and the good that we seek in prayer with our wills. Put another way, the commemoration in this ancient ceremony of Christ's presentation in the temple, in which his whole redemptive mission is foreshadowed, anchors and centers us on the person and work of Christ – his mission to us and to the world – and our consequent part in that mission, both as its objects and its agents. In so doing, if we are paying attention, this Christocentric festival anchors us against the distortions of aestheticism and moralism. If we are paying attention, it so anchors us in the gospel that we shall not be tempted to reduce our religion to mere feeling, or to our social and political agendas.

The primary test of any sermon – any teaching, any act of witness or counsel – is the Christocentric one: is it centered (rhetorically and logically) on the person

and work of Christ? It's not enough to propose Christ's teaching and example for us to follow: that's giving us a moral standard without equipping us with the grace we need to meet it - as if all we needed was to 'try harder'. It sets us up for failure, or (still worse) a Pharisaic self-righteousness. The acknowledged gravity of sin, the greatness of God's grace, and the perfection of his redeeming work for us, are the only basis on which moral effort is not futile and moral renewal is possible. Then we can begin to fulfill that claim in the obedience of a faith that is not in ourselves but in Christ. Then also we can begin to grasp what moral claim the gospel is making on our obedience: for it is by the gospel that the full extent of the moral law is known, in the grace that perfects nature. By this test, a great deal of Episcopalian preaching today falls short.

If Christocentricity is the test of good preaching and teaching, it is also the test of a good lectionary (or pattern of reading Scripture) used in preaching. By this test the modern three-year lectionary of the Episcopal Church falls short also. It does read a lot more Scripture than the ancient one-year lectionary preserved in the 1928 Prayer Book (and followed here at St. John's on Sundays and other holy days): but the expansion in quantity comes at the expense of quality. I have done a detailed analysis of its shortcomings elsewhere, but its faults can be summed up in one pithy observation: if you want to know more about the Bible, use the three-year lectionary; if you want to know more about Jesus, use the ancient lectionary. The ancient lectionary is profoundly Christocentric – the focus is always on what Christ has done for us (often in the gospel lesson) as the pattern and template for what he is doing in us (often in the epistle lesson).

To speak in these terms about the scripture we read, and the teaching and preaching based on it, is to bring out the deep connection between the ministry of the word and the sacrament: for it is the sacraments above all that anchor us in the person and work of Christ. Baptism incorporates us into Christ — makes us one body with him, and partakers of the redemption he


was accomplished for us, our deliverance from wrath into favor, the remission of sins by spiritual regeneration, that we may continually die to sin and rise again to righteousness. The Lord's Supper centers our lives on the Cross of the Savior, sustains us in the communion of his Body, that in him and by his grace we may offer ourselves to God, our souls and bodies, as a sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, "not only with our lips but in our lives". And thus we complete the movement from his presentation in the temple to our own self-offering. In the words of the Candlemas Collect, "as thy only-begotten Son was this day presented in the temple in substance of our flesh, so we may be presented unto thee with pure and clean hearts, by the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord".
