

How We Worship - The General Thanksgiving

"In everything give thanks" (1 Thessalonians 5:18). Giving thanks and praise to God for his blessings is one of the essential parts of worship, and traditionally was expressed in the psalms and canticles of Morning and Evening Prayer, as well as in the Eucharist. In the 17th century prayers of thanksgiving for deliverance from particular evils (drought, famine, war, etc.) were added to the Prayer Book (pp. 50-53), and in 1662 a prayer of general thanksgiving was included, and it became so cherished that it was included in the services of Morning and Evening Prayer (pp. 14 and 33). It was composed for the Prayer Book by Edmond Reynolds, a Puritan sympathizer who had sought to reconcile Episcopalians and Presbyterians in the Church of England and was made Bishop of Norwich in 1661. It begins by acknowledging God's mercies, first in general, and then more particularly: the temporal blessings "of this life", followed by the spiritual blessings of redemption, "the means of grace" (Word, Sacrament, and in the very circumstance of our lives), "and the hope of glory" (the ultimate fulfilment of God's gracious redeeming love for us). After the acknowledgment of these mercies, it then turns into a petition for his grace, to make us aware of his blessings, and really thankful for them, "not only with our lips but in our lives": so that the thankfulness we feel moves us to self-offering: "by giving up ourselves to thy service, and by walking before thee in holiness and righteousness all our days". Gratitude for grace is the energy of Christian life; it is what motivates us to serve and please God in all things.

Music Note

Basil Harwood was born at the family estate called Woodhouse in Gloucestershire, England. He received an education that was broader than that of most British organists of the day. In his teens, he studied piano with J. L. Roeckel at Clifton College and organ with George Riseley at Bristol Cathedral. He took theory and composition with C. W. Corfe while an undergraduate at Trinity College, Oxford. The youngest son of a wealthy Quaker banker, after graduation from Oxford, he followed in the footsteps of other well off young British musicians, like Hubert Parry and Charles Stanford, taking lessons in composition at the Leipzig Conservatory of Music, Germany. His professors there were Carl Reinecke (who had been a pupil of Mendelssohn and Schumann), and Salomon Jadassohn (a past student of Liszt), of whom Harwood said "he taught me much." He then began his career as a church organist, occupying posts at St. Barnabas' Church, London, Ely Cathedral, and Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford. His father died in 1907, and two years later he retired from church work in order to assume responsibility for running the Woodhouse estate, and so as to devote his undivided attention to composition.

The Three Cathedral Preludes, (of which the second serves as the opening voluntary today) illustrate Harwood's church service prelude style at it best, it might be argued. Their composition was the result of his happy associations with southwest England. The composer's association with the Three Choirs Festival was lifelong, especially the Gloucester Festival, where first performances of several of his major choral works were given. In 1911, as a token of respect and gratitude for their friendship and assistance in his career, Harwood dedicated the Three Cathedral Preludes to the three Cathedral organists of the day, A. Herbert Brewer of Gloucester, G. R. Sinclair of Hereford, and Ivor Atkins of Worcester, respectively, There is nothing programmatic in them, except that they convey the impression of a cathedral organist improvising in a dignified, spacious building before a service.
