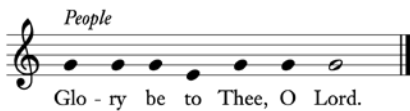

Those who are baptized, have attained to years of discretion, and have been admitted to communion (which at St. John's, is normally by confirmation, but for visitors may have taken place by other means) are welcome to receive the Sacrament. All others are welcome to receive a blessing at the altar rail by kneeling and crossing your arms over your chest.

To receive the Host, please place your right hand over left, at the level of your chest, and lift the Host to your lips. To receive the chalice, keep your head and neck straight, lightly grasp the bowl or stem of the chalice and guide it to your lips.

Self-intinction (dipping) of the Host is not permitted for hygiene reasons. If you do not wish to receive the chalice, you may depart after receiving the Host, or cross your arms over your chest.

HOW WE WORSHIP – THE TWELVE DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

The secular calendar is in a hurry to reach Christmas – moving into celebratory gear even before Thanksgiving – but almost as soon as Christmas actually arrives, the ornaments come down as speedily as they went up. It's a classic greed-gulp-gratification pattern, culminating in binge followed by remorse. The Church's year teaches us to wait, to prepare, to let expectation build, and then once Christmas begins on December 25th, to continue its celebration for twelve days as the faithful savor the tidings of comfort and joy brought to us by the angel and the shepherds. Three holy days follow Christmas – St. Stephen, St. John, and Holy Innocents – and then on the "octave" (eighth day) of the feast is commemorated the circumcision of Jesus (which happened on the eighth day after his birth) – the sign of the covenant between God and Abraham, which Jesus fulfills by the perfection of his loving obedience unto God; the first shedding of his blood, by which our own failures to keep the covenant are atoned for; and his being named Jesus, as the word of God ordained, which means "Savior" (or, "the Lord saves"), which indicates the work he accomplishes by his blood. It's not a coincidence the Octave of Christmas and the Feast of the Lord's Circumcision is also New Year's Day: in the beginning of the earthly life of him who is without beginning, is the right place for us to begin all our years, all our days, all our life. The twelve days of Christmas conclude (after "Twelfth Night") with the feast of the Lord's Epiphany on January 6th, when we celebrate the manifestation ('epiphany') to the world of God's glory in the humanity of the Virgin's son.
